Prof. E. E. Prince, Ottawa; Hon. J. W. McLean, P. E. I.; Richard O'Leary, Richibucto, and S. T. Wilson, Halifax, members of the Dominion government shell fisheries commission, are in the city today and this afternoon at 3 o'clock will hold a private executive session at City Hall. Tomorrow morning at 9.30 o'clock they are to hold a public meeting in City Hall, at which they will hear the views of local fishermen interested in shell fishing. The commissioners have already held sessions in Charlotte county. Professor Prince who is chairman of the commission, told the Globe that the idea of holding the sessions was to get first hand information on the conditions of shell fishing and also to test the feeling of the fishermen on the laws at present regulating these fisheries. Hon. Mr. McLean, of Prince Edward Island, said that the meetings so far had been most successful. The fishermen had displayed keen interest in them and were not a bit backward in giving expression to their views. In Charlotte County the general feeling among the fishermen was that the lobster and oyster seasons ought to be extended. These they deemed would be in their best interests. Opinions to the contrary were expressed in Prince Edward Island, however, the fishery packers there considering that in the interests of shell fishing the present open season should be shortened. John Calder, Dominion inspector of fisheries for St. John and Charlotte counties, accompanied the commissioners to the city.—St. John Globe.

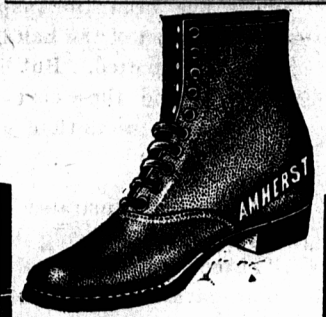
