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HAINES BROTHERS MUST STAND TRIAL

All Hope of Bringing Slayers of Annis to Speedy Trial Has Been Given Up.

NEW YORK, August 24. — All hope of bringing the Haines brothers to a speedy trial for the killing of William E. Annis at the Bay-side Yacht club last Saturday, has been given up by District Attorney Darren, of Queens, John F. McIntyre declaring that "he was making the announcement at the concurrence of Mr. Darren said that the time will not be before the middle of November."

No attempt will be made for release on bail in the meantime, nor will Haines brothers ask for a change of venue, and at the hearing next Saturday they will not waive examination when re-arrested. A conference will be held tomorrow regarding a plan of defence and it may be decided then whether or not to ask for separate trials. At the conference held today regarding the conduct of the case and such points, the prevailing sentiment favored basing the defense on the confession which Mrs. Hains is alleged to have made to her husband, but which she says was forced to sign. Mr. McIntyre said that he will be able to get that statement before a jury. Counsel for accused brothers are not in a mood to make overtures to Mrs. Hains in order to obtain her assistance at the trial. They hold that if called upon she will be compelled to repeat in court what she had said in this alleged confession.
