SIX G.N.R. CARS HURLED FROM TRACK

Train Going 50 Miles an Hour Nears Burning Bridge—Brakes Applied.

(Canadian Press.) WINONA, Minn., Sept. 18.—Six cars of the Great Northern East-bound train, which were hurled from the track by a burning bridge on the Burlington Railway three miles east of Winona today.

Two passengers were slightly hurt. The cars were later destroyed by the fire.

The train was running at the rate of fifty miles an hour and was within 500 feet of the trestle when the engineer observed the fire.

The emergency brakes were applied but too late to stop.

THIS CHILD, BORN WITHOUT A BRAIN LIVED FOUR YEARS

BERLIN, Sept. 17.—The German medical press records the remarkable case of a child which lived for nearly four years without any trace of a forebrain. Neurologists explain that the case demonstrates the absolute dependence of human beings on the fore or posterior brain, and shows that a human cannot carry on the ordinary processes necessary for his preservation without it. The fish or frog without the forebrain has greater capability than had the child in question.

The case of the child is especially noteworthy because of the long duration of life. In other cases the brainless life lasted only for a few days, and the movements of the child did not differ in any respect from those of a normal child. In the case under discussion the child lived three and three-quarter years, permitting numerous extensive observations of its state. The child remained in a condition of continual sleep. Its arms were flexed and rigid.

PATHETIC APPEAL BY MARY COPLEY THAW GOES TO GOVERNOR

COLEBROOK, N. H., Sept. 17.—Thaw while here gave out a telegram which his mother, Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw sent from Montreal to Governor Feltner. He added that she would not come here at present in view of the uncertain status of affairs. This is her telegram.

"To His Excellency, Governor Feltner: I address your excellency in the interests of my son, H. K. Thaw, who, after being deprived of the liberty the average acquitted man would immediately have received after a verdict of not guilty upon the ground of the defendant's insanity at the time of the commission of the act charged under the indictment, had to clear himself of the charge of five and a half years' hard labor in one of New York's worst penal institutions. Finally he took the only recourse left—a flight for the freedom denied through malice.

"May I beg that your excellency will secure to him, in whatever way proper, a fair and impartial hearing during the impending proceedings?"

FRENCH LABOR MEN PLAN TO BE RID OF ANARCHIST IDEAS.

PARIS, Sept. 17.—An important movement to rid trade unionism of anarchist methods and combine workers of the chief trades on the British model by a series of conferences since July, 1st., indicates success, and the general Confederation of Labor is taking the lead in the movement. The result is that anarchist and socialist exploration among the workers, though momentarily successful, has since reacted to such extent that unions have been losing more thoughtful to the extent of tens of thousands yearly. FRENZIED MAN USED REVOLVER

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Sept. 16.—M. Bouelle, director of the San Sebastian Casino, was shot dead last night before the eyes of 1500 people gathered around the gaming tables. About midnight a man in evening dress in the doorway was seen to draw a revolver and fire at the ceiling. A panic ensued and the crowd stampeded, amid the terrified screams of women. Bouelle rushed toward the man, who fled until he was within a few feet of him and then turned the revolver on the director, firing the remaining five shots.

HARVESTERS NOT HAVING VERY GOOD TIME IN WEST.

EVESTAN, Sask., Sept. 17.—Six months' hard labor without the option of a fine was given a harvest hand from Arizona for stealing a suit case from a hotel. A large number of harvesters have been hanging around the past two weeks asking abnormally high wages, and the magistrates have instructed the police to round up all loafers, and if they will not clear them out of town, wages to be charged and they will be charged with vagrancy and jailed. Seventy-five were hanging around yesterday, but since the police issued this warning, the streets are practically clear. The men are determined to hold up the farmers for more money than they can earn.

NEW ROSS RIFLE SIGHT IS TO BE ISSUED NEXT YEAR.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17.—It was announced at the Militia department today that the new rifle sight made by the Ross Rifle Company and adopted by the Dominion government, will be issued next year. It is expected that some 20,000 sights will be issued to the troops during next season. These are the same sights as the Bisley and Palma trophy teams used this year.

The militia authorities say that after next year every one shooting at the Dominion Rifle Association and at the provincial matches will have at use the same sight, namely the one adopted by the government. At present almost any sight is allowed, and great numbers of different patterns are used in the matches. The idea of first opening the doors to all sights was to ascertain which type was best. After next year all the troops will be issued with the one sight and only these will be allowed.

ALPINE TRAGEDY

PONTRESINA, Switzerland, Sept. 17.—The bodies of four Alpine climbers who had been missing since September 12 were found today in a crevasse on the Palu Peak in the Upper Engadine, near here. They were said to be all experienced mountaineers, but were caught in a series of heavy snow storms, which cost them their lives and also hindered the rescue party in their search.

SABBATH BREAKING.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 18.—The lid is being nailed down here on Sunday. One newspaper, street hack company, telephone company, and many others are reported as Sabbath breakers. Railway and steamship companies also will be prosecuted.

PRINCE COUNTY FAIR AND EXHIBITION

Rain Interfered With First Day's Attendance—Splendid Showing of Animals—The Show a Credit to the County. Prize List.

(Special by Phone) SUMMERSIDE, September 19.—The Prince County Exhibition which opened at Summerside yesterday compares favorably, notwithstanding the late harvest and the unfavorable weather, with those of other years. The exhibit of live stock is exceptionally good, some classes having more entries than in previous years, while the quality is very much better. The exhibits in the building while fewer than in former years were very creditable indeed. The Exhibition was formally opened at 2.30 p. m. by His Honor, Governor Rogers. Hon. J. E. Wyatt presided and in his opening remarks said that although the fair was not as large as might have been wished, yet the exhibition was a credit to the county and would have been a credit to any similar show in the Maritime Provinces. His Honor in opening congratulated those present on the quality of the exhibits and pointed out the educational importance of these fairs. Considering the extraordinarily late harvest, the unfavorable weather and the anxiety of saving the crops, he was surprised to see such a large exhibit on the ground, especially that of live stock and the steady improvement being made along agricultural lines from year to year. There was one class which he did not find represented and he would suggest that this class be added to the prize list, at future fairs, and that was exhibits of fur farming, which he believed was now of as great importance as ordinary farming. He then formally declared the fair open.

Hon. M. McKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, followed. In his opening remarks he congratulated the county on the grand showing of live stock. He remarked that Prince County was noted for having the best cattle in the Maritime Provinces. He told of what was being done in the way of agricultural education, such as Short Courses, Stock Breeders' Association, Farmers' Institutions, etc., and in conclusion advocated the amalgamation of all the efforts being made along these lines. Hon. John Richards in his opening remarks deplored the unfavorable state of the weather, not only for the exhibition, but for the gathering of the crops. Speaking of the exhibition itself, he was pleased to see that although perhaps smaller than last year, yet it was fully up to the standard of other years. "No place," he said, "could excel Prince County" and at the recent Toronto Fair, he could not find anything to equal the showing of root crops to be found here to-day. As to the live stock, he was of the opinion that several of the animals shown here to-day would have carried off first prizes at that fair, thus showing the Islanders can raise horses here better than in other sections of Canada. He spoke of the excellent showing of dairy cattle, but was sorry to notice the falling behind in the beef raising section here where prices were much higher than elsewhere, which forced our meat dealers to import fat cattle from Ontario.

After a few remarks by Superintendent Clark, of the Experimental Station, who gave a short and comprehensive account of the work being done there, the chairman called upon Chief Sark, who was loudly applauded upon rising. The Chief said that he was no speech maker and that when he was asked to speak for the governor he met there should be little speech but much wow-wow. He would therefore dispense with any speech-making and instead gave an impromptu (scalping) dance without the usual dramatic ending.

Attorneys for the live stock men declare that the transportation company cannot refuse arbitrarily to accept any kind of legitimate freight. Steamship men, on the other hand, declare that the recent Cuban quarantine laws make a longer carrying ship can afford to allow. A committee probably will be sent to Cuba to treat with the government of the island.
