Establishment of a training school in Toronto to convert inexperienced unemployed girls into competent domestic servants, adept at all household tasks, from preparing and serving meals to arranging flowers and announcing visitors, was recommended to the board of control yesterday by the mayor's Committee of Unemployed Youth.

Hail 100 Years Of School Days With Tom Brown

(By Thomas T. Champion) Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Oct. 21—Boys of all ages from eight to 80 will be interested in a centenary which falls during the present school term—a centenary, though, which is not likely to have any formal commemoration. It is about 100 years since Thomas Hughes, author of that classic story of schoolboy life, "Tom Brown's School Days," went as a new boy to Rugby School. Born Oct. 20, 1822, he died March 22, 1896, after a remarkably varied career.

Unemployment Reduced.

In England, the committee reports the problem is being met by five training centres which are turning out hundreds of qualified domestic workers and reducing unemployment among girls.

The course suggested by the committee would include instruction in preparing, cooking and serving of all meals, laundry work, proper care of various rooms of the house, correct cleaning of furniture, windows, metals and carpets, care of clothing and linens, plain sewing and mending, food values, food classification, advantage of mixed diets, personal hygiene, care of skin, hair, teeth and hands, sanitation and ventilation home nursing, care of infants and small children, first-aid.

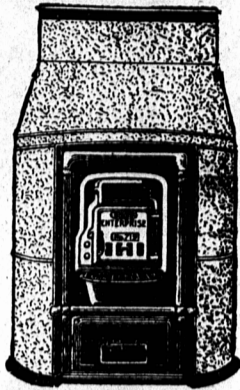

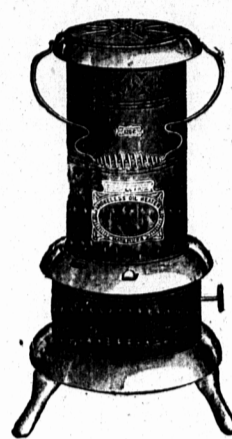
