Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THIS synopsis of a family or any male over 18 years of age may be obtained at a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years. Extra cultivation. Pre-emptor patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of youth, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

HOW THE CHATEAU LAURIER FARES

M. le Chef has a good many worries these days for in the large hotel the responsibility for food saving, rests chiefly on his shoulders. In fact many of the managers rely absolutely on their chef to experiment with substitutes and to cut down on the use of wheat, beef and bacon.

Perhaps no hotel in Canada is more cosmopolitan or better known than the Chateau Laurier and it is interesting to know how he achieves some of his remarkably palatable dishes. For instance, a favorite at the Chateau Laurier is Mashed Turnips—A La Brisse, prepared in this fashion: Roast a piece of mutton (or lamb—any part) for about 15 minutes in a hot oven. Chop 3 or 4 turns fine and add to the lish. Then cook for another 10 minutes. Slice some turnips and put in the same pan with the onions and mutton. Add salt and pepper to taste, a little hot water and cook well until the turnips will mash. Serve with the mutton.

There is the ubiquitous carrot, that most health-giving and beautifying of vegetables. It can be prepared in more ways than the average woman dreams of. Carrots Grad Mere is prepared as follows: Clean carrots and boil for 20 minutes. Strain same. Put in roasting pan with small onions and a little fat. Cover and leave in oven for from 40 to 50 minutes.

Another of Canada's best-known chefs is M. G. Embregts of the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec. The following is one of his favorite potato recipes:

Tune—"The Tarpaulin Jacket."

A patriot potato lay tubbing, tubbing. And as in the water he lay, he lay. To the cook who the mud off was scrubbing, scrubbing. These valuable words he did say:

Keep me wrapped in my nice khaki jacket-jacket. The best of me's lost with the skin, the skin. Dish me up when the heat starts to crack it, crack it. And eat me from outside to in.

Do you wish to reduce your bread ration, ration? Then bake me and serve me with cheese, with cheese. Or with anything else in creation, 'ation. Your grocer will yield to your pleas.

"Keep me wrapped," etc.

Very soon to the polls you'll be going, going. And wonderful things will ensue, ensue. But it's up to you now to be showing, showing. What women with taters can do. "Keep me wrapped," etc.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Military Service Act, 1917.

Men 19 and 20 Years of Age. Harvest Leave.

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship. Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.

Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to go report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

Harvest Leave.

Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship.

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother; (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

Procedure to obtain leave of absence.

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.
