NO LIQUOR TRAFFIC IN FRENCH WAR ZONE.

HAZENBROUCK, France, January 20.—Traffic in spirituous liquors has been prohibited by the military authorities in the zone occupied by the army. The decree announces that the step has been taken because of a recrudescence of drunkenness in the zone, involving danger to the health of troops and the civil population. Both civil and military authorities had complained of the scourge as a hindrance to the development of production required for the national defense. It was the unanimous wish of the patriotic population of northern France, the decree asserts to have the traffic restricted as the only effective means of fighting alcoholism. Natural wines, beers and ciders are not affected.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any issue over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub Agency on certain conditions. Titles—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 cents per acre. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a pre-empted homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months each of three years; cultivate 30 acres in direct house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on under certain conditions.
