SIR FREDERICK BORDEN RETIRES FROM MILITIA AND DEFENCE.

OTTAWA, August 1.—The resignation of Sir Frederick Borden from the portfolio of Militia and Defence is stated to be in the hands of Sir Wilfrid E. M. McDonald, Pictou, long in line for preferment, it is understood, was tendered and accepted the other day.

President Hays of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was here a day in conference with Laurier, Hon. Geo. Graham and Commissioner Roubin of the National Transcontinental Railway, with regard to the taking over by the G. T. P. of the completed section of the National Transcontinental from Superior Junction to the water level terms of the Company's agreement with the Government. The company expects to handle a large share of the wheat crop over this road to Fort William this fall.

The question of taking over other parts of the National Transcontinental as completed, and putting on train service, was also discussed. No arrangements have been made, and a further conference will be held later.

Sunday last the services on the Hazelbrook field were conducted by Rev. A. H. McCabe who spoke to large and attentive congregations at each service. At Hazelbrook in the evening Miss Lavina Ross of Vernon River sang a solo very sweetly.

The S. S. Posalind of the Black Diamond Line sailed at 11 o'clock yesterday forenoon for St. John's Newfoundland, via Sydney. Her outward cargo from here consisted of fifty two head of cattle, twelve hundred bags oats, sixty nine bags potatoes, one hundred and thirteen turkeys, ninety boxes of vegetables, fifty cases of eggs, 50 cases of cheese, forty eight packages butter and sundry other cargo.

The schooner Sir Louis put into this port yesterday in distress. The vessel was bound from Halifax to New York with a cargo of hemlock lumber. Last Friday during a heavy southeasterly gale off the N.S. coast the vessel lost her deckload of lumber and her boat, also the water-casks and every movable article was carried away by the heavy seas. Part of the fore-castle was broken and carried away, and all the steward's supplies were damaged. The cooking stove was smashed and other damage done, and to make matters worse the schooner commenced to leak. After the storm abated the captain decided to run his vessel to this port, being then off the mouth of the Bay of Fundy. The captain said he had been out in very severe storms, but this one was the worst he ever saw. The Sir Louis is owned by Peter McNutt, of Darnley, P. E. Island, and is 68 tons register, and was built in 1841. The vessel will probably be put on the blocks here to be repaired.—St. John Exe.

Felix Charlan, chief of the Tobacco Division of the Dominion Government was here yesterday on a short visit. He came from Ottawa to examine the results which could be obtained from the growing of tobacco. He gave much instruction and advice which will be of the utmost possible value and expressed himself very hopeful that, while the highest grades of tobacco cannot be produced in this Province a good quality and large yield of pipe tobacco may be obtained. He estimated that nearly half a million pounds of tobacco were consumed in this province, most of which could be grown here. This amount could be grown by three hundred farmers planting one acre each and there is always a large market for the surplus. The Messrs MacPhail this year at Orwell planted one acre of tobacco which is doing well. The drought having no injurious effect whatever upon it. They expect to harvest it early in September when the results of this, their first experiment, in this line will be awaited with much interest. The Dominion expert has declared that conditions here are favorable for producing a profitable quality of tobacco and there is no reason why the profits from this crop should not compare favorably with the daily industry. Tobacco growing demands close attention but not very hard labor. It will furnish a pleasant as well as a profitable occupation for women and children in picking the leaves preparatory to curing. Tobacco growing has been taken up in this Province spasmodically in the past but not very seriously the first practicable attempt being made this year at Orwell.—Exe.
