Nineteen Carnegie library buildings
have been erected in Ontario within the
past eighteen months.

Last season the Minto was placed on the
Charlottetown-Pictou route on 31st March
and continued till the 11th of April when
the Princess began her trips. This year,
owing to much heavier ice, we shall have
to wait yet a while.

Unsan, the Korean town reported to be
occupied by 500 Cossacks, is situated ab-
out 80 miles due east of Wiju and 30
miles south of the Yalu River. The
Russians appear to be withdrawing from
the Yalu at its mouth and threatening
the right flank of the Japanese advance.
The region round about Unsan is moun-
tainous.

It is noteworthy that Sir Wilfrid
Laurier in his speech on the amended
agreement with the Grand Trunk Pacific
said nothing about the portion of the line
between Quebec and Moncton. Mr.
Borden, who replied to him, expressed his
belief that the section in question is to be
abandoned. This statement was received
in silence on the ministerial side of the
House.

Just as The Guardian intimated at the
time the first announcement was made of
the terms of settlement of the French
Shore question, the amount of the indem-
nity to be paid to France was inaccurate.
The amount first stated was three
million francs, about \$600,000. The
present intention is said to be to submit
the value of the concession to the Hague
tribunal for decision, which seems to be a
fair proposal.

It now appears that the ninth, or was
it the eighth, bombardment of Port Arthur
took place on April 3. Togo is determined
to make things lively.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

A FALSE IMPRESSION.

MR. EDITOR:—Owing to my effort to
bring about what to my mind would be a
more satisfactory and profitable method
of disposing of the live hogs and other
stock of this Province, an impression has
arisen that from the Dominion Packing
Company or otherwise I was to get re-
muneration (other than the enhanced
value of my stock) for the promotion of the
proposed arrangements and that other
than myself had a hand or say in suggest-
ing or promoting this matter.

Now Mr. Editor, taking into considera-
tion the active part I have taken in this
matter, I can with the sincerest charity
forgive the persons who have been so dis-
posed to think; and were I in their posi-
tion I might be of the same opinion; so
were I the only person who might be in-
jured by such suspicions, I would not
deem it necessary to notice these false
conceptions; I say false; yes Mr. Editor;
from the bare fact that no person or per-
sons, company or corporation had in any
way or manner, directly or indirectly offer-
ed any suggestions or were consulted in
making or publishing those propositions,
until after they were submitted to the
public at an Institute meeting at Searle-
town, neither did I know if they would be
acceptable to the company until I received
Mr. Wiley's letter on my way to Otta-
wa, a copy of which was published dur-
ing my absence.

It might be of interest to those concern-
ed to know that while in Ottawa, in com-
pany with Rev. A. E. Burke and Professor
E. J. MacMillan, I waited upon Mr. F.
W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Com-
missioner, requesting his aid in securing
a competent person for Inspector, and his
presence and advice at our meeting,
which he very kindly promised but owing
to illness and press of business he was
unable to attend.

Hon. Mr. Rogers is conversant with my
attitude in this matter and is perfectly at
liberty to give any information asked.

In the report (of some papers) of the
convention at Charlottetown, I am
wrongly reported to have said that in
Denmark the shrinkage is deducted from
the hog at the shipping station.

It must be admitted that it is abso-
lutely impossible to make a correct deduc-
tion for the shrinkage of any live ani-
mals at the shipping station or any-
where else.

The method in Denmark is, the hogs
have a numbered tag inserted in the ear
before shipping, the hogs are slaughtered
and weighed at the Packing House, and
the farmer is paid for the dressed carcass
without any reference to live weight.
There is one very important point in the
selling of live hogs I would like to men-
tion.

Under existing conditions, the man
who has a hog weighing 200 lbs. of 2nd or
3rd quality bacon, or not fit for bacon at
all, and can contain an almost unlimited
quantity of feed when delivered at the
station, and will not dress out more than
65 per cent., of five cent pork, receives as
much for his hog as the man who delivers
a 200 pound hog that cannot contain half
as much feed as the former, and will
dress out 80 per cent. of No. 1 bacon,
worth 70 per pound.

Now you will see the first hog is worth
\$6.50 and the latter \$11.20.

Now Mr. Editor, I would like to ask if
the present method is not placing a pre-
mium on the hog that is capable of carry-
ing to the Packing House, the biggest
stomach load and the poorest carcass.

Farmers as a rule lay in their stock of
seeds, such as wheat, oats, clover, timo-
thy, etc., early in the season, but the
supply of seeds for the vegetable garden
is left for "any old time." After the
farm crop is in, it is plenty time in the esti-

should be reversed. As a rule the garden
plot is fit for tilling before the rush of

planted before that, it is generally left to
