MOCK PARLIAMENT.

Owing to the unavoidable absence of the Speaker a chairman of Committee of the whole House was appointed. The mantle of authority and confidence fell on Ernest Harris. On his taking the chair as Deputy Speaker the House was called to order.

Several questions were hurled at the Government by honorable members of the Opposition. On Government order being reached the Debate on the amendment to the Draft Address was resumed by the Honorable member for Yankton (Opp) D. E. Matthews. His peroration proved a fitting close to the remarks, statistical, political and poetical, which had delighted the House on Monday last.

The Leader of the Opposition followed in a witty speech, affirming that the Opposition stood by their amendment and would press to a division. The member for Hastings (Mr. Howatt, Opp) followed in a sharp, incisive address, defending the Government's programme.

As in quotation, accurate in application the honorable member's speech made a great impression on the House. The member for Yukon (C. Gavin Duffy, Opp) followed in another of his brilliant efforts and dwelt, much to the amusement of the Minister of Militia and Defence on the mandatory form of the address.

The next speaker, the member for Montreal (Mr. Taylor, Gov't) spoke ably on the question of Canada's making a contribution to the British Empire. He still had the floor when the Speaker left the chair at ten p. m.

SYDNEY, C. B., is asking for legislation for municipal lighting. COMMANDER Spain has returned to Ottawa after inspecting the Lightship Larcher off Yarmouth.

The Guardian is pleased to learn that Wallace Fields has almost recovered from his recent exposure in the cold. A NEW C. P. R. Hotel, the largest in Canada will be finished at Winnipeg next year. It will be seven stories high with 215 guest chambers and 63 staff rooms.

B. E. PEARSON, of Halifax, is quoted by the Toronto News as saying that the Dominion Iron and Steel Company would soon be employing 5,000 men and A. B. Aylesworth says a bounty of \$3 per ton may be put on steel rails.

THE C. M. B. A. of Georgetown have presented President (Capt.) Hugh McPhee and Ex-Recording Secretary T. W. McDonald with addresses accompanied by handsomely bound prayer books in appreciation of their services. The addresses were signed by Rev. S. T. Phelan, H. S. McPhee, Thomas E. Morrissey and Peter A. Hughes.

A few days ago in the House of Commons Mr. McLean was told that one dredge, the Prince Edward, was employed in P. E. Island by the government. During 1904 they dredged at Belfast, Morell and Vernon River Bridge. Another dredge for this work was under construction. The government had not heard any report of dangerous conditions at the harbor of Crapaud.

THE RAILWAY On the Railway line yesterday good work was done. Conductor Hibbett reached Georgetown at 4.15 p. m. and leaves for the city this morning. Conductor Stanley came to the city after going two miles east of Mount Stewart towards Souris, and arrived at last night. He had left the city on Saturday at noon. A freight and passenger train in charge of Conductor Gillis was also sent to Mount Stewart yesterday returning and clearing the track in the afternoon. Conductor Davey is past Bear River coming to Mount Stewart. Conductor McKenna reached Cape Traverse at noon and left again for General at two. Last night he had got to within a mile of Kinkora. The line west was badly blocked by a storm yesterday. Conductor McKee reached Tignish with engines at 5.30 but had to leave the cars outside some three miles. Conductor Kelly coming to the city was past Colville and Conductor Fanton was almost to Bradallane.

At a special meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon the resolution to be submitted at the Capes Ferry meeting was considered. Geo. E. Fall reported on his trip to Ottawa re the reduced rates on freight to the Mainland and the West India service. The delegation which was composed of both Liberal and Conservative members and was greatly assisted by E. M. McDonald, Pictou, visited upon Sir Richard Cartwright, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and urged their claims strongly. They also ably pressed upon the Minister that the ten year contract with the Steam Navigation Company be not renewed at least till better rates and service are guaranteed. A strong plea was made to have the West India steamship service to be established shortly make Charlottetown a calling point, and the Council guaranteed at least 300 tons cargo on each trip. Capt. Craig, who was present, asked for recommendation of a subsidy to the North American Transportation Co's steamer Restigouche for a service between Charlottetown and Glace Bay such as the Elliott held, but as a subsidy was intended for a local company the board felt unable to endorse it.

SCHURMAN LOOKS FOR "FREE" CANADA

President of Cornell Predicts Independence—He Voices Doctrine of Our Domination by United States.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—A New York special to the News says: At a meeting of the Presbyterian union at the Hotel Savoy last evening, Jacob G. Schurman, President of Cornell University, aroused enthusiasm as he pointed possible expansion of American protectorate, if not American sovereignty, over Canada, the West Indies, and possibly of some of the Latin South American States. "I do not believe the annexation of all the West Indies and most of the South American states would be a very agreeable thing for us, but the trend is that way. Another problem that faces this country is the effect of the immigration of Americans into the great wheat fields of the Northwest Territory. What political effect it is going to have I hardly dare trust myself to say, but I look forward to a Canada that will become a free and independent state, and it is my firm belief that, if we do not expand in that direction at once, we shall at least soon be in a position where we will be compelled to clasp her hand as a sister state striving with us to maintain political and religious liberty, such as we now enjoy. She will not long consent to remain a mere colony."

Mr. John Schurman is a Canadian by birth, having seen the light first at Freetown, Prince Edward Island, where he was born on May 22, 1854. He was educated at Acadia College, Nova Scotia, where in 1875 he won the Canadian Gilchrist scholarship in connection with the University of London. He graduated there A. B. and A. M. in course 1877 and 1878, and later studied at Paris, Edinburgh, Heidelberg, Berlin and Göttingen. He was appointed President of Cornell in 1892. Mrs. Schurman was a daughter of the late George Munro, the New York publisher, who died in 1896, and was also a Canadian. President Schurman has relatives in Sydney.
