VIENNA, Jan. 20—"The net result of the British and Russian action in Persia renders a nation which was making progress toward peace and order and was building up its finances for the establishment of a constitutional government, a land of chaos and anarchy without prestige among its own people and, in addition, has meant the sacrifice of hundreds of innocent lives."

This statement was made today by Morgan Shuster, the American, who

was deposed from the place of treasurer-general of Persia recently, and has just arrived here.

"The Mohammedan people," continued Mr. Shuster, "are further aroused against the Christian nations. Great Britain and Russia, far from being on a more solid basis of friendship, are now face to face on opposite sides of a disorganized territory.

SHALL THEY BE REMOVED? QUESTION IN MONTREAL. OTTAWA, Jan. 24—The question of

NEW YORK, Jan. 20—Officials of the Geographical Society and various similar organizations interested in polar expeditions are generally awaiting word from Captain Robert Falcon Scott, who was expected to reach the South Pole on Christmas Day, and they believe that when he announces the result of his British Antarctic expedition, it will be to say that his quest was successful.

Lieut. Shackleton of the British Navy, reached the farthest south on January 9, 1909, ninety seven geographical miles away from his objective point, and then turned back only because he ran short of provisions.

Captain Scott has 750 miles to cover from his winter quarters to reach the South Pole. His journey consisted of a dash across the comparative level ice to the ice barrier some ten thousand feet above the sea level, and then to the Pole. The Scott expedition was outfitted as an exploring party was never equipped before. The British Government subscribed \$100,000 to the fund and the British public contributed an equal sum. Accompanying him in addition to a picked crew, were five

lieutenants of the royal navy, two surgeons, and three biologists. Three motor stages were carried in the hold of his vessel, seventy otters of provisions, 130 dogs and 30 Siberian ponies.

BULLET IN HEART OF MAN DOCTOR CALLED APOPLEXY VICTIM.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. January 20—Emil Kilstrom, 66 years of age, president of a local fuel company, was found dead in his office early this morning with a bullet through his heart. It is believed he was the victim of hold-up men.

When Kilstrom's body was found a physician was called and he ascribed death to apoplexy superinduced by cold. Not until the body was taken to the undertaking rooms of his son, was the bullet wound discovered. Coroners and detectives instituted an investigation, and obtained clues to prove that the fuel dealer was the victim of two hold-up men, who left no tangible clues to their identity.

RUSSIAN EXILE TRIES SUICIDE.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 22—It is reported here that since Prof. Vladimir Sensinoff, who was condemned to exile in Siberia for alleged revolutionary intrigues, attempted suicide, abated and he is allowed the use of the rigors of his treatment have been scientific instruments to continue his work. 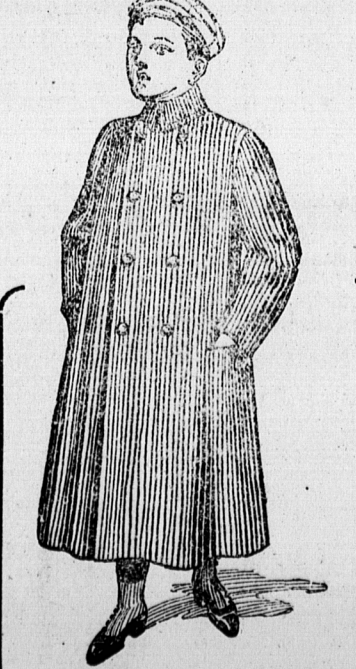
