"Carrier Current" System Installed By C. N. Railways

MONTREAL, Que., April 27.—Application of "carrier current" to the transmission of telegraph and telephone messages over the lines of the Canadian national telegraph between Montreal and Toronto yesterday marked the passing of another milestone in the development of rapid transmission of business messages between points in Canada.

The "carrier current" system, developed only within the last few years, is the sending of "carrier waves" similar to those radiated through the ether in radio broadcasting, except that the radio carrier waves radiate in circles, uncontrolled as to direction, whereas in "carrier current" telegraph and telephony, the carrier waves are controlled and made to follow physical wires as a directional agent between terminal points.

By use of the "carrier current" facilities now placed in operation for the first time in Canada, only one pair of wires, which were already in use are required for the operation of ten full duplex Morse circuits, two composite Morse circuits and a long distance telephone circuit between Montreal and Toronto.

The new installation will increase the capacity of the telegraph system by ten times, and will provide an increase in telegraph facilities for patrons of the national system corresponding to the stretching of ten new pairs of copper wires between the two cities. While in Canada the "carrier current" system has thus far been installed only between Montreal and Toronto it will shortly be extended to serve Toronto, Winnipeg and later also Winnipeg, Vancouver.

Carrier channels are expected to carry in service as far west as Winnipeg by June 15th and the extension to Vancouver will follow.

Signaling the opening of this new service, the following message addressed W. D. Robb, vice president of the Canadian National Railways was sent from Toronto to W. G. Barber, general manager of Canadian National telegraphs: "The carrier telegraph installation Montreal-Toronto has been completed and is working successfully. This message goes to you as the first message over a four channel multiplex operating at fifty words per minute on one of the carrier telegraph channels. This is the first time in telegraph history that a carrier telegraph system has operated successfully carrying both multiplex printer and Morse telegraph messages over its various channels at such high speed."

To this Mr. Robb replied as follows: "Please extend to all concerned my hearty congratulations on the inauguration of telegraph service by four channel multiplex through the medium of the carrier current system. This is an epochal event and a further indication of the leadership of the Canadian National in the installation of such improvements. The carrier current system is used extensively by the American telegraph and telephone company, and also in Europe. This is its first introduction to Canada however.

The carrier "wave" is an alternating current of very small actual power, but has a high frequency per second. By this use of oscillation with condensers and coils carrier "waves" of different frequencies are set up and these frequencies have an almost unlimited range, although for ordinary commercial purposes on carrier current telegraph systems the range of frequencies is between 3,330 and 10,000 cycles per second and has been found to be the most desirable and economical. This range of frequencies provided ten (10) carrier telegraph channels although utilizing higher frequencies up to 30,000 cycles per second, additional telegraph channels, up to 30 channels can be secured over one pair of

physical wires between terminal points. The latter addition has not up to the present time, proven to be commercially satisfactory but it is a possibility.

For the carrier system it is stated that it is not affected by aurora borealis or "earth currents" and that it ensures continuity of communication. The carrier systems have been known where one wire of the physical lines has broken and fallen down without affecting the carrier system. An other case is cited by Canadian National telegraph engineers where the whole pole line, wires and all was under water during a flood for a considerable time and the carrier system worked while other circuits were useless.

There was no difficulty in extending the carrier channels to physical extensions it was stated by telegraph company officials and there has been no trouble experienced as far as Morse operation is concerned. When questioned as to the quality of the signals spoken very highly of the clearness of the signals. An interesting experiment was conducted when all ten channels were inter-

connected and with Toronto sending on channel No. 1, signals were repeated back and forth Toronto to Montreal ten times and were received with the same clearness and with absolutely no distortion. This would be equivalent to a wire circuit 3,340 miles long working through ten repeater stations.
