Army Officer Returns Home

A former Arizonian whose decorations include the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, and Purple Heart with cluster, returned to Phoenix this week for his first visit in three years.

Col. H. Hunt, former civil engineer in the Yuma bureau of reclamation office, came here to visit his aunt, Mrs. E. E. Miller, and Mr. Miller at their home, 897 East Roma avenue.

The veteran, who grew up in Miami, but was born in Troy, P. E. I., is on terminal leave until April. In the army for almost five years, he spent 24 months in the European theatre before returning to this country.

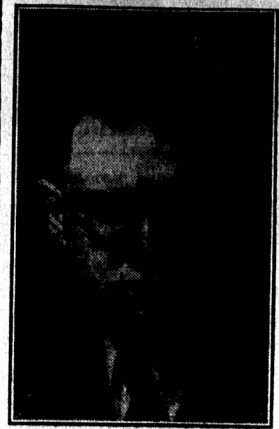
While overseas he took part in the Southern France, Ardennes, Rhineland, and Central Europe campaigns. He won the Silver Star Medal, awarded for gallantry in action, when he continued to direct an armored task force near Chateaufort, France, after being wounded. The action took place in November, 1944.

The Purple Heart which he received on that occasion was his second. He was awarded first for wounds received a month earlier.

He won the Bronze Star for meritorious service in Germany. Colonel Hunt served with the Fourth Armored Division. On leaving Germany, he will go to Southern California for a vacation, then return to his present home in Salt Lake City. He will work with the bureau of reclamation there.

Col. H. A. Hunt who is the son of the late Mrs. Charles W. Hunt, was formerly Mrs. Frankie Howatt of Troy, P. E. I. He was born on P. E. I. going to Arizona when a small child. He still has friends and relatives in this Province who will learn with satisfaction of his successful career.
