Mr. LePage Called Promptly To Order For Improper Remark

Liberal Member Exceeds Privileges Of The House In Attempting To Criticise Supreme Court Judiciary. Dr. J. F. McNeill Follows With Criticism Re Oyster Leases.

The wide latitude given Opposition members in the Draft Address debate by Mr. Speaker Strong was exceeded yesterday by Mr. B. W. LePage, Liberal member for Second Queens, when he attempted, in the course of his criticism of alleged negligence in enforcing the prohibition law, to bring the Supreme Court judiciary into the political arena by commenting on a statement made in Court by the presiding Judge.

The Speaker promptly informed the hon. member that he was out of order. Mr. LePage, venturing to insist that the Speaker should quote his "authority" for such a ruling, received a further snub. "You may produce any other authority," the Speaker said.

Mr. LePage was permitted to quote the Court statement, in which reference was made to an increase in perjury since prohibition, but he was not allowed to comment thereon.

Among other statements advanced by Mr. LePage on the prohibition question was the charge that the Prohibition Commissioners "were the biggest bootleggers in the Province"; that there were only two members of the R.O.M.P. who were "tee-totallers"; that members of the force had been seen intoxicated and were, as a body, disinclined to enforce the liquor laws. He claimed to have knowledge of a smuggling vessel and of the liquor landed last season, only a small part of which he alleged had been seized by the police.

seconded of the Address (Messrs. Donald) He did not agree with all that was said however. He found in the Throne speech nothing new. Conditions are different to what they were a few years ago and radical reforms must come, and come quickly. This Province had been dealt very kindly with by Providence, and a clause of the speech might properly have acknowledged this blessing. It was to selfishness that Mr. LePage attributed most of the depression prevailing throughout the world.

Referring to necessary repairs to the Legislative building, Mr. LePage said the Government should take the position into their confidence. The Premier said he had gone specifically into the details of what was to be done. Mr. LePage admitted he was not present in the Legislature at the time.

Both the Premier and the Minister of Public Works had encroached on the Agricultural Minister's ground and left that gentleman nothing to say in the present debate, Mr. LePage declared.

The Old Age Pensions Act, he said, had been put on the statute books by Liberal Governments at Ottawa and in this Province. The Conservatives had promised the Federal Government would pay 100 per cent and this pledge had been violated.

It was two years afterwards that they brought it into effect, but the Province still pays 25 per cent.

Premier MacMillan: "Might I ask my hon. friend when did he pass the Act?"

Mr. LePage: "We passed the Act in the Spring of 1931, in this Legislature."

Mr. J. A. MacDonald: "When did you promise it?" (Laughter.)

New Prohibitive Duties Are Investigated

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

OTTAWA, March 13—Reports that prohibitive duties have been imposed on Canadian fish, onions and potatoes by the island of San Domingo are being studied by the commercial intelligence branch of the Dominion Government, Hon. R. B. Hanson, Minister of Trade and Commerce, told the House of Commons today.

The matter was raised by William Duff (Lib. Antigonish-Guysborough) who said he had received telegrams from Maritime exporters about the San Domingo duties which, it was said, would mean a loss of \$250,000 a year to Maritime export trade.

Mr. Hanson said he also had received a telegram and his officials were looking into it. He might be able to make a statement later.

Protest Is Disallowed

MONCTON, N. B., March 13—Froisits lodged against the Indians on grounds of some players' ages apparently were not to be allowed by the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

President James Wry and Secretary-Registrar H. F. Tennant of the M. A. H. A. left town after an investigation yesterday, saying they were sure all Indians were eligible for junior play.

Answers Other Criticism

Another contention of Mr. LePage's had been that the Sanatorium, if placed on the College site, would make a "better looking building." This criticism was dealt with humorously by Mr. Arsenault, who cited it as an example of the kind of ideas the Opposition members had as to what constituted an adequate educational institution.

He also scored a statement of Mr. LePage's that the Government plans for Falconwood Hospital contemplated an institution "to take care of all the insane people in Canada." The real purpose of the institution was to provide for the treatment of mental cases, as explained on many occasions by the Premier, was cited in disproof of the Opposition statement that \$35,000 in architects fees had been paid "for one building." The Government, on the expert advice of representatives of the Mental Hygiene Council had endeavored to provide a proper treatment facilities for our mentally ill, which are not available today. For this they had been criticised and misrepresented. The Opposition leader's interest in Falconwood, when in power, had been centered chiefly around "the Holsteins, the hoes, and the roots."

Mr. LePage: "And the cranberries. Don't forget them."

Hon. Mr. Arsenault: "Mr. Speaker, we realize that there is a kind of mental deficiency that cannot be cured." (Loud laughter.)

Mr. Arsenault then analyzed Mr. LePage's suggestion of a bonus to farmers to decrease their potato production, which he showed ended in an absurdity. The great fallacy, he emphasized, lay in the emphasis placed on seed production during the Opposition leader's own regime as Minister of Agriculture.

Mr. LePage's Ambition

The member from Rustico (Mr. LePage) had dealt long and eloquently with federal politics. Mr. Arsenault had been puzzled as to the reason, but found, on inquiry, that hon. member had ambitions in the federal field. He commended the hope that the member would be more successful in his efforts than he was at the last Liberal convention. (Laughter.)

Opposition criticism of Mr. Bennett as being a "wealthy man" was scored by the speaker, who emphasized the great work for Canada that the Dominion Prime Minister is doing. His policies of economic and social reform were cited as evidence of Mr. Bennett's deep sincerity and concern with his responsibility.

Answering criticism regarding the potato marketing scheme, Mr. Arsenault pointed out that the scheme represented the consensus of opinion of the farmers themselves. The Government had not dictated a policy to the producers. The Leader of the Opposition wished to dictate what he thought should be done, but that was not the purpose of this Government. "We believe in giving the farmers every assistance, but we don't believe in dictating to them how they should frame their marketing scheme," he said.

The present debate, Mr. Arsenault recalled, was the first in which Mr. LePage had not "shed tears over the Technical School." It was just as well that the Opposition leader had

form the Province as to any policy intended to be adopted by the former for the encouragement of the oyster or other mollusk industry as soon as such policy is decided upon, as well as of any changes that may from time to time be made in such policy as such changes are decided upon."

Fixes Responsibility

It was on the challenge to "read Clause 9" that Hon. Mr. Arsenault produced the whole agreement, and read all the pertinent clauses, fixing clearly the responsibility on the Saunders Government, not only of handing over "the right and power of control and administration" of the beds provided the Dominion Government did not grant the areas "except by way of lease", but also providing that "the terms and conditions" of the old agreement of 1912, under which Dr. MacNeill himself had held a lease, should be "observed in all respects by the Dominion."

"He was himself a member of that very government that signed that agreement in 1928," added Mr. Arsenault, charging the Summer-side Liberal representative with having unfairly attempted to foist the responsibility on his Conservative successors in office.

"There was loud applause from the Conservative benches."

Mr. Lea's Responsibility

Another strong point made by Mr. Arsenault was the failure of the Provincial Department of Agriculture under Mr. Lea's administration to emphasize the benefits of mixed farming. "If the agricultural policy pursued by the Saunders-Lea Government had been sound," he said, "our farmers would not be in the position they are in today." (Applause.)

Under Liberal rule, Mr. Arsenault continued, the farmers had been encouraged to go into the seed potato business on a large scale and to mortgage their crops to purchase fertilizer.

Instead of mixing with the small farmers and giving them the benefit of the Department's advice and assistance, he charged, Mr. Lea had preferred sitting in his office surrounded by some of the large farmers. The present Minister, on the contrary, has been travelling all through the Province, mixing with the poorer farmers especially and encouraging them to go back to livestock production and mixed farming.

Vanished Liberal "Unit"

Mr. Arsenault also dealt with the fishermen's problems, stating that in his district nothing had been neglected to provide work for fishermen, and that the Government had made an effort in this regard in every fishing community.

Liberal criticism that the Government was "extravagant" was also analyzed by Mr. Arsenault in the light of the statement made by Mr. Lea, in the last year of his administration, that his own lavish expenditures had been incurred for "revenue producing assets." Where, he asked, are these assets today? \$300,000 had been borrowed to spend on imported gravel; "and where," asked Mr. Arsenault, "has it gone?"

Dr. MacNeill had claimed this was all the gravel that was left on the roads today. That, Mr. Arsenault suggested, was because the Doctor "could not distinguish the go red Island gravel on the roads; it is there just the same, and has proved very serviceable." (Applause.)

"Broadening Out"

Analysing the present Liberal "economy" cry still further, Mr. Arsenault recalled the boast made by Mr. McIntyre when Minister of Public Works, that "we should broaden out and spend more money," and that our farmers should be prepared "to pay more taxes." That, he showed, was the Liberal attitude when in power, and they had not then the obligation which the present government has, of providing so much work for unemployed, due to world economic conditions.

Ridiculing Mr. Lea's criticism of the roads because Mr. Lea had broken one of the springs of his car on them at one time, Mr. Arsenault pointed out this might have occurred anywhere.

Mr. Lea, interrupting, contended that he had broken more than one spring.

Hon. Mr. Arsenault: "I have seen drivers of the same type, who have broken more than springs." (Laughter and applause.)

Turning back the pages of Liberal financial history, Mr. Arsenault recalled that in 1912 the outgoing Liberal party had left a debt of \$1,072,000, and that when the Conservatives went out of office, this debt had only been increased by \$200,000. Subsequently, the Liberals had piled up a debt of \$1,177,000. In the last eight months alone of the Lea administration they had increased it by \$844,000, while the Conservative increase for the remaining four months of the year amounted only to \$5,000.

F. W. C. Foundation

The contention of Mr. LePage, that the Government had "wasted \$200,000 by not using the old foundation at Prince of Wales College" was analyzed. The new foundation had cost only \$20,000. "How," he asked amid laughter and applause, "could we have saved \$200,000 by using the old one?"

Mr. LePage maintained the reference had been to "the entire building."

Mr. Arsenault showed that the old foundation was wider than the building. If it had been used, the

Bold Theft At Noon Yesterday

The office of The Dominion Life Assurance Company was boldly entered about one o'clock yesterday afternoon and a cash box containing about \$20,000 in cash and \$200,000 in cheques stolen.

The box was later found in the corridor outside the offices of Dr. J. E. Corrigan and Dr. W. H. Soper, further down the block.

The box had been pried open, and the cash taken, but the cheques left. Major J. A. MacKenzie, the manager, stated that the office had been left without any member of the staff for about twenty minutes. It is not known how entrance was effected, but the intruder left by the front door, leaving it partly open.

As Dr. Soper entered his office he noted the cash box, but thought that it was the property of a man who was in his office on business. He thought nothing more about it until his visitor was leaving when he drew the visitor's attention to the box, who claimed he did not own it.

Dr. Soper, on lifting the lid of the box, found it contained a number of cheques made out to the Dominion Life Assurance Co. He at once communicated with Major MacKenzie, who had just discovered the loss. Major MacKenzie states this is not the first time articles have been stolen from the office.

The police are working on the case and developments are expected shortly.

Annual Meeting Bruce Stewart Co. Ltd.

The Annual General Business Meeting of Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., was held at the Company's Head Office on Monday evening, March 11th, 1935.

The Director's Annual Report and Financial Statement was presented to the meeting by the Secretary-Treasurer and it is pleasing to note considerable improvement in business was reported during the past year. building would have to "taper from the bottom up." (Laughter.) The fact was, he pointed out, that the Government had consulted expert educationists who knew what was wanted both for present and future requirements. "We did not go around the country talking to every old woman" he added. "We went to those who were qualified to express an opinion on the subject, and who were best in touch with educational problems and knew and understood our requirements along educational lines."

"We are not a part of the amount of money the Government expended in rebuilding Prince of Wales College," Mr. Arsenault declared amid applause.

Prohibition Criticism

Referring to Mr. LePage's criticism regarding Prohibition enforcement, Mr. Arsenault expressed surprise at the "wonderful knowledge" which the Rustico member professed to have of the inner workings of the bootleg and smuggling system. "He even professes to know the number of trips made by the smugglers, the messages that are sent by wire and the movement of the airplanes in the air. He seems to be in daily communion with some powers—either from above or from below. He even professes to know that there are only two Mounted Policemen that do not take a drink." (Laughter.)

Such statements, Mr. Arsenault said, after citing a number of them, were a reflection on a very fine body of men, who are well qualified to enforce the laws of the Province. He pointed out that there are about ninety men in the forthcoming King's Jubilee and to the Carliev anniversary celebration at Charlottetown last summer. The veneration of the distinguished French delegation on that occasion was a matter of great interest and appreciation, particularly to the Acadian population.

Conservative achievement in the matter of obtaining subsidy increase from Ottawa was trenchantly summed up by the speaker, who contrasted the achievements of the Stewart and MacMillan Governments with the barren record of the Bell-Saunders-Lea administrations.

The work particularly of the present Premier was commended by Mr. Arsenault, who said in this connection: "It is known that when he goes to Ottawa after a thing he generally succeeds, because he is not looking for favors for himself, but is working solely in the interests of the Province." (Applause.)

"Is it any wonder that our friends opposite are trying their very best to minimize our work on this matter?" he asked amid applause. "They realize now the great failure they made."

In his opening remarks, Mr. Arsenault congratulated the mover and seconded of the Address, and referred eloquently to the forthcoming King's Jubilee and to the Carliev anniversary celebration at Charlottetown last summer.
