MacIntyre, whose beauty and winsomeness has long been remembered.

Lord Willingdon Is First Guest

(Special to the Guardian)
TORONTO, Ont., June 12—With a ceremonial flourish of his pen across Page One, Column One, in the unused guest book, Lord Willingdon yesterday officially registered as the first guest in the Royal York Hotel. Flanked by dignitaries of this city and the Canadian Pacific Railway, the governor-general culminated the months of preparation for this local day with a flourish of important officialdom.
Beneath the great rotunda solemn words of greeting were extended by E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which built the hotel; B. A. Neale, Manager of the Royal York, and Sam McBride, Mayor of Toronto. The latter's greeting was extended on behalf of the people of the city. Mr. Beatty supported a splendid delegation of C. P. R. directors, bade the governor-general welcome on behalf of the hotel owners.

Thus, with simple and impressive ceremony the Royal York, one of the largest and finest hotels in the world, became a public institution—as much a part of Toronto as the Union Station—an architectural splendor that stretches its beauty across the lakes in welcome to visitors from all ends of the world. This was the spirit of growing Toronto reflected throughout the world. It was more than the opening of a hotel. It was a gesture of Toronto's growing greatness—a cosmopolitan gesture to all the world's travellers.

Mr. Beatty and his directors arrived at the city hall at 11 o'clock and were received by Mayor McBride, members of the board of control and the members of the city council. Mayor McBride read an address of welcome. Following the civic function, Mr. Beatty returned to the Royal York where at the main entrance he received Lord Willingdon whom he conducted to the register as the first guest of the hotel. The interesting and historic scene was witnessed by visitors from all parts of the Dominion. Many of these were board of trade members who came as guests of the Toronto board of trade to the banquet tendered by the latter by President Beatty.

Eighteen hundred guests stood in the great hall as John A. Tory, president of the board of trade, escorted President Beatty to his place at the head table, and there occurred a demonstration of remarkable enthusiasm. Above the platitudes of the assembly could be heard the shrill scream of the pipes being played by Lieut. Charles Dunbar and Pipe Major S. B. Featherstone of the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders who won the E. W. Beatty cup at the Banff Highland festival. Pipe Major A. J. MacPherson of the 75th Toronto Scottish played in right royal style the guest of honor to his place. A word from Mr. Beatty and Lord Willingdon rose! In a few simple words he declared the hotel open to the public.

Tourist Traffic Shows Increase

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., June 12—The tourist traffic brought \$250,501,000 into Canada in 1928, according to an estimate published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This is an advance of nearly \$35,000,000 over the figure of \$210,763,000 for 1927. The increase is largely due to heavy influx of motorists from the United States, the report shows. For 1928 the total expenditure in this category is placed at \$167,384,000 as against \$134,426,000 in 1927. Expenditures by Canadian tourists in other countries were slightly decreased according to the calculations. Comparative figures are: 1928, \$103,245,000; 1927, \$103,782,000.

URG E GOVT. TAKE ACTION

(Special to The Guardian)
OTTAWA, Ont., June 12—There is a disposition among those in authority to recast Canada's fiscal arrangements and something sweeping along this line may be expected before the prime minister dissolves parliament.
Today representatives of western live stock interests are in Ottawa urging governmental action with a view to marketing in Britain the live Canadian cattle which will be excluded from the United States by the new tariff. It is suggested the government bonus the shipment of Canadian cattle to Britain near to the extent of \$5 per head.
According to members of the government there is quite a demand throughout Canada that some tariff action be taken by this country to protect our interests. The government already is giving serious consideration to Canadian needs, in view of changes made by other countries, notably the United States.
Hon. James A. Robb, the Minister of Finance, says Canada is trading with the whole world and not merely with the United States.

International Conference Necessary

(Special to the Guardian)
MADRID, June 12—Foreign Minister Gustave Stresemann of Germany and Foreign Minister Aristide Briand of France today came to the conclusion that an international conference was necessary for decision by all interested parties on evacuation of the Rhineland and the Saar. They held a long private conversation this evening in which both showed the greatest friendliness.

Although they discussed in generalities the subject both agreed on the impossibility of reaching any decision without consulting the fully authorized representatives of Great Britain and Belgium. Members of the Council of the League of Nations met in secret session as a committee and examined the draft report and draft resolution on the subject of minorities concerning which differences have been expressed by several statesmen.
The committee finally agreed to submit the report and resolution to a plenary public meeting of the council, each member reserving the right to give explanations or make reservations. It was indicated today that Dr. Stresemann might seek to have the matter postponed until September.

Favors Change In Communion Service

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., June 12—Simultaneous drinking of wine by preacher and congregation during communion was deplored in a report to the 55th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church here this morning. The report was presented by Rev. T. B. McCormick, convener of the committee on public worship and aids to devotion.
"The committee," he said, "feeling assured that the best interests of the church will be secured by the use of a distinctly Presbyterian service and not one alien to Presbyterian usages, strongly urges ministers and sessions to follow the time-honored practices of our fathers."
"Especially would the committee deprecate innovations in our communion office. The drinking of the wine by ministers and people simultaneously in the communion service must be abhorrent to every devoted soul and appear little less than sacrilege, suggesting as it does the drinking to a health or to an immortal memory."

Besides the appointment of the standing committees for the year this morning's session was occupied with the further consideration of the report of the pension board. As a result of the decision taken the whole question of contributions to the pension fund has been referred to a conference of the administration with the pension board to report at the next assembly. In the meantime the existing regulations are to be continued.

OTTAWA, June 12—Canada's funded debt has been reduced by \$7,000,000 since 1922 and not by \$90,000,000 as claimed by Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance. This was the contention of Hon. Hugh Guthrie, (Conservative, Wellington South) in the House of Commons this morning during consideration of estimates for the Department of Finance.

On the vote for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Mr. Woodsworth volced an old grievance about members of the force acting as spies upon labor organizations and themselves creating trouble. The minister of justice stated that if the member for Winnipeg could supply him with specific instances of such practice the department would have them investigated and dealt with accordingly to their merits.

Prorogation will certainly take place on Friday, if not tomorrow night. The Hon. Mr. Bennett leaves tomorrow night to start on his grand tour of Ontario. He will be accompanied by General McRae for a portion of the time and by others according to convenience and circumstances.
