A SAD accident occurred on the I. O. R. near Hopewell, N. S., yesterday afternoon. About half past three, as the mid-day express from Halifax was coming up to the station at Hopewell, an elderly man named McLean, driving a fish cart, undertook to cross the railway track quickly in front of the engine. The engine struck the wagon smashing it and killing McLean almost instantly. McLean belonged to West River, N. S., and was about sixty years of age. Hugh and Mrs. McInnis were among the passengers on the train at the time of the accident.

AMONG recent cattle bought by Frank Drake, Hillsboro Street were three fed by Benj. Mutch, China Point, one cow tipping the scales at 1455 lbs and two oxen each weighing 1230 and 1135 lbs. B. Morrissey sent four oxen weighing 1280, 1170, 1140 and 1120 lbs, and Malcolm McLeod one ox weighing 1350 lbs. A finer lot of cattle it is difficult to find. Mr. Drake had in his market stall last market a carcass of beef which dressed 900 lbs. It was that of a three year old steer bought from that well known feeder, Samuel Cameron, of Hampton and was one of the best of the age seen in the city for years.

MARTIN PINEAU, the noted boat builder, has now in construction for Harry Crossman a handsome gasoline launch that will surpass anything yet seen here. The hull of the old Abegweit thirty feet over all has been remodelled entirely, a cabin 11 feet long with wheel house is being built and the boat will be artistically painted and finished by Mr. Crossman. She will have gasoline engine of four horse power, besides sails. There will be two masts, one hollow for an exhaust pipe of the engine which will be absolutely odorless. The tank will be in the bow and there will be a tender tank which can be pumped from the wheel house. Mr. Crossman expects to have the launch in the water by Dominion Day.

The remains of the late Miss Charlotte Montgomery, the Persian Missionary, are expected to arrive from New York tonight and will be taken to the old home at Malpeque, George R. and Mrs. Montgomery drove from Murray Harbor yesterday and proceeded to Kensington while D. Montgomery, Alberton went to St. John yesterday to meet the remains. The death of Miss Montgomery was entirely unexpected by her friends. Last summer she visited for some time in P. E. I. returning to Hamadan, Persia in autumn in excellent health. In April she went to Teheran for consultation and although the physicians pronounced the operation which was necessary for tumor not to be dangerous they advised her to go to New York to have it performed as the high altitude in Persia was not conducive to convalescence. She reached New York about June 1st, accompanied by her physician Dr. Mary Smith, had a highly satisfactory operation on the 6th and the next news, received last Saturday, was of her death. No particulars have yet been received.

FASTEST LONG DISTANCE TRAINS

CHICAGO, June 12.—On its initial run from New York, the Pennsylvania Railroad eighteen hour "Flyer," the fastest long distance train in the world, arrived in this city at 9.52 o'clock this morning, three minutes ahead of schedule time. Miles were frequently reeled off in from 44 to 50 seconds. 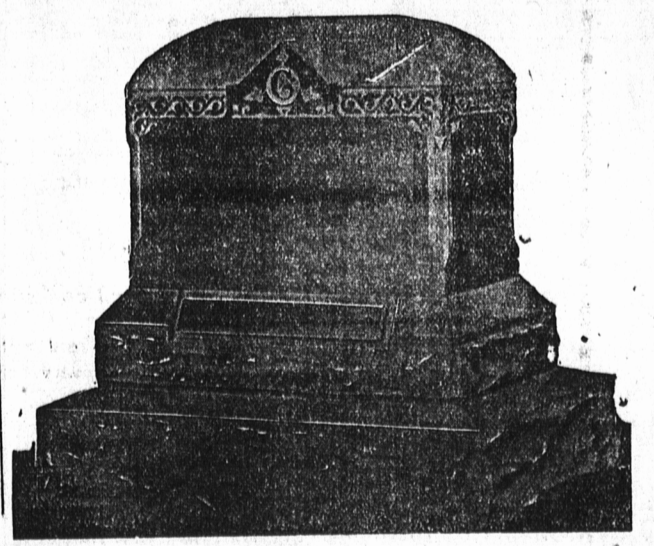
