W. D. CURRIE, son of Archibald Currie, Souris, crosses to the Mainland at first opportunity for Ottawa where he has a position in connection with the Transcontinental Railway Survey.

Last week Prof. J. W. Robertson spoke in Montreal on the Improvement of Rural Education among the English speaking people of Quebec. He especially emphasized the scheme of consolidation.

The Master of the Rolls reached Georgetown yesterday afternoon about four o'clock. The Court will meet today and likely adjourn till next term. H. J. Palmer acting for the Crown accompanied Judge Hodgson.

A. S. MAHON of Bryant & McDonald, Halifax, and T. E. Girvan of Emerson & Fisher, St. John, returned yesterday from a tour of the eastern part of the Island. They drove to Belfast, Cardigan and Mount Stewart returning from the last place yesterday morning.

The death took place at Souris a few days ago of Elizabeth Stewart, wife of John McLaughlan in the 85th year of her age, leaving an aged husband in Souris and two sons in British Columbia, one son in Colorado, and one daughter in Buffalo, U. S. She was a native of North River.

THE Stanley on Tuesday with the members of the Southern King's Board of Trade went as far as Cape Bear. They reported the ice more or less broken up with considerable lolly but no leads. The steamer ran a number of times against the barrier but could not make any decided progress. On returning to Georgetown speeches were made in appreciation of the work of the Captain. The ice on Georgetown harbor is reported 10 inches thick in some places.
