## Detroit Tigers Win From Athletics 2-1 For Sixth Victory

(Canadian Press) Detroit Tigers ran their winning streak to six straight yesterday (Wednesday) as they downed Philadelphia Athletics 2-1 in 11 innings.

In other American League afternoon games, Boston pounded Cleveland 7-4 and New York Yankees scored a 3-1 victory over Chicago. St. Louis Browns and Washington played a night game. Lefty Lou Brissel lost a tough one as the Tigers beat the Athletics. He had a one-hit 1-0 shut-out through eight innings but couldn't hold it.

Dick Wakefield's double, Hoot Evers' sacrifice and Pat Mullin's one fly tied it up in the ninth and the Tigers won with three straight hits in the 11th, by Evers, Mullin and Lou Campbell.

Philadelphia's lone run came on Ferris Fain's seventh inning homer and the A's got only five blows off Art Houtteman, young Detroit right-hander who took his second straight win after eight straight losses.

The Red Sox hit Bob Feller to his fifth straight defeat with a barrage of 13 hits, including seventh inning homers by Ted Williams and Bobby Doerr.

Williams, with a walk, two doubles and a single in his other turns at bat, had a perfect day at the plate. His 13th homer sailed over the left field fence with Johnny Pesky on base through a walk.

Stan Spence then singled and Doerr clouted his seventh circuit blow of the season.

Ken Keltner pounded the ball deep into the lower left field stands in the fifth inning for his 15th home run and the Tribe's first tally off right-hander Joe Dobson who yielded six other hits.

The Yankees' Alie Reynolds went the route for the first time since May 11, holding the last-place Sox to seven hits in gaining his seventh victory of the season.

The Yanks won the game in the first inning, scoring twice on

George Stinwells' single, Cliff Mape's double, a ground out and Joe DiMaggio's single. They added another run in the fourth when Stinwells singled, stole second and scored on pitcher Glen Moulder's error.

Reynolds blanked the Sox on three hits until the sixth when they scored their lone run on Tony Lupien's double and shingles by Pat Seery and Taft Wright.

In the lone night game at St. Louis, a four-hit eighth inning attack by the Browns, including doubles by Al Zarilla and Paul Lehner, gave them a 6-5 victory in a see-saw battle with the Washington Senators.

Both clubs hit freely in the eighth and Washington threatened in the top of the ninth but Al Widmar came in and set the Senators down after two men reached base.

## Yanofsky Second In Tourney Play

KARLOVY VARY, Czechoslovakia, June 16.—(CP)—Lajos Steiner of Australia escaped defeat at the hands of Abe Yanofsky of Canada when they completed play today in an adjourned seventh-round game of the international chess tournament.

That left two British Commonwealth players among the first three in the 19-round tournament in which 20 players are entered. Steiner leads with 5 1-2 1-2. Yanofsky, Winnipeg chess master, and Milan Vidmar of Yugoslavia are second with 5-2. Yanofsky still is undefeated.

Behind Yanofsky and Vidmar in the standings are Vasha Firic of Yugoslavia, Dr. Xavier Tartakow of France, Gedeon Barcza of Hungary and Gosta Stoltz of Sweden, each with 4 1-2 2 1-2.



## Pittsburgh In Tie With Boston For Lead In National League

(By The Canadian Press) Pittsburgh Pirates moved up into a tie with Boston Braves at the head of the National League yesterday (Wednesday) when they scored an 11-5 victory over New York Giants.

The Braves were beaten 8-5 by Chicago Cubs, the first time the lowly Bruins had beaten the Bostonians this season in eight tries. New York's loss pushed the Giants into third place. Previously they had been tied with Pittsburgh.

One night game was played. St. Louis at Philadelphia was rained out.

Manager Bill Meyer's pirates lagged five giant pitchers for 12 hits including homers by Johnny Hopp and Wall Westlake. Four errors along with a couple of mental lapses by the Giants aided the Pirates considerably.

The Pirates scored three times in the second inning on three singles, a walk and errors by Sid Gordon and Mickey Livingston to take a 4-1 lead.

New York tied the count in the fifth of two walks, Bobby Thorne's triple and an error by Ed Fitzgerald but the Pirates bounced back with two in the sixth on Westlake's homer, Ed Stevens' double and Fitzgerald's one-bagger.

The Pirates sewed up the contest with three more runs in the seventh and two in the eighth with the aid of miscues by Gordon and Buddy Kerr.

After the fifth, the Giants managed to get only one hit off Ernie Bonham, Johnny Mize's 10th homer in the eighth inning. Bonham cut the route yielding only six safeties.

Home runs by Eddie Waitkus and Andy Pafo and some good relief pitching by Emil Kuhn enabled the Cubs to win over Boston.

Boston starter Bill Voiselle had a terrible time as he gave up four hits and got only one batter out in the five men he faced. One of the hits was a home run into the right field bull pen by Waitkus which also scored Hank Schenz who had singled.

Red Barrett replaced Voiselle and went along fine until the fifth when, with the Braves leading 5-4, he gave up successive singles to Waitkus and Hal Jeffcoat and a home run to Pafo which was sliced into the bullpen for three runs.

Bob Hogue and Clyde Shoun followed Barrett to the mound and the Cubs went scoreless until the ninth when they tallied an unearned run.

Kuhn came in in the fourth for Chicago, relieving starter Bob McCall, and after a shaky beginning slammed the door in the Braves' faces.

Carl Furillo's single with one out and the bases jammed in the ninth inning, gave Brooklyn Dodgers a close 4-3 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Marvin Rackley, just up from the Montreal farm team, scored from the lead-off position in the ninth. Ralph Branca went the route for his seventh triumph of the season. He had a no-hit for 7 2-3 innings before Johnny Wyrostek hammered a home run with one out to tie the score at 3-3.

## Press Gallery Wins 19-17 Baseball Tilt Over Commons Team

OTTAWA, June 16.—(CP)—The Press Gallery puffed and staggered to a 19-17 victory over the Commons tonight in a weird and wonderful softball game inaugurating the Class Z Parliament Hill League season.

Everybody seemed to have a whale of a time. But from highly-reliable and thoroughly fagged-out sources it was learned that a return engagement is anything but certain.

"Battle fatigue" gasped Bob (Toronto Star) Nielsen, the scribe manager, when asked for post-game comment.

The reaction of 75-year-old Rev. Dan McIvor (L-Fort William), the Commons' mastermind, was harder to pin down. He muttered darkly about the umpires—Senator Stan McKeen (L-British Columbia) and Revenue Minister Jim McCann.

With or without "umpire help," game done by men upset the press. The Commons, sparked by colorful, comical Bucko McDonald as pitcher, had been expected to wallop the living daylight out of the writers.

The members had not only Bucko—Liberal member for Parry Sound and a former professional hockey player—but also Doug (Taxes) Abbott at first base, fast-stepping Don (Babe) Fleming (PC-Toronto Eglinton) at shortstop, big Bob Winters (L-Queens-Lunenburgh) catching, and all sorts of other fast-stepping boys in top-top physical condition.

But the scribes came up with a dark horse in Bob Carisse, a press gallery assistant. He hadn't pitched since 1945—at Nijmegen, during the Canadian Army campaign in the Netherlands—but he was really "on" tonight. Having been a sergeant in a bomb-disposal squad, he didn't find it very tough to dispose of members of Parliament. It was sloppy fielding by his team mates which enabled the Commons to pile up as many runs as they did.

The big hitters were Winters and D'Arcy (Canadian Press) O'Donnell, both of whom connected for home runs. Harry (Toronto Star) Hindmarsh drove in Johnny (Canadian Press) LeBlanc in the last inning with what turned out to be the winning run. (It was LeBlanc's birthday anniversary).

The game was played on the deep-green centre lawn in front of the Parliament buildings. A crowd of 500 chucked and guffawed at

the players' antics—and slipped 30 bucks into the two tin pie-plates Mr. McIvor had passed around. The money was earmarked to purchase sports equipment for Commons' page boys.

The Commons paraded to the field to the doleful wail of bagpipes played by their no. 1 Scot, Tom Reid (L-New Westminster). Photographers had a field day. They "shot" Doug Abbott and Jim McCann and Stan McKeen—and the numerous heated arguments—from every possible angle. Commons Speaker Gaspard Fautoux wearing a dark suit and a black homburg hat, was judged into the opening ceremonies as first batter.

He smashed a line drive down the third-base line, narrowly missing a photographer. Later on he hustled "angrily" into a fuss box on home plate, got all set to clip umpire Jim McCann on the jaw and was dramatically pushed back to the Commons' bench.

The game was called after five innings—and 1 1-2 hours. All the players seemed to have some sort of job awaiting them in the House of Commons.

Scoring five runs in the second inning and adding two more in the last half of the third, Ev.
