THE END OF THE WAR

The good news that the German plenipotentiaries had signed the armistice terms and that hostilities had ceased came not altogether unexpectedly yesterday morning, our Sunday telegrams leaving no doubt that the end of the war was at hand.

The Telephone Company has the Guardian's and the people's thanks for the first announcement which came at 6 o'clock from Halifax as follows: "Armistice signed on field of battle at 5 o'clock this morning." This was confirmed after the Telegraph Office opened by the following despatch filed by our own correspondent in Toronto at 2 a. m. A special edition of the Guardian was issued at 7 a. m. and, as the Mayor had ordered the fire bell to be rung, was speedily brought up and the edition exhausted by 9 a. m.
