OBITUARY.—We record today the death of Duncan Fraser, Esq. of East Whim Road, Lot 59— which took place at his late home on Thursday the 8th inst. The deceased was the eldest son of the late Donald Fraser of Belfast and brother of the late Rev. Allan Fraser of Alberton, and of Mrs. Hector C. McMillan of this city. In early life he was employed by the late Wm. Doune in the cattle and oat trade to the Newfoundland and English market, and afterward by that gentleman placed in charge of the Pinette Mills. He subsequently owned the Albion Mills at Sturgeon and after some years entered upon a dry goods and grocery business in Georgetown. In 1873 he removed to Whim Road where he spent the remainder of his days. Mr. Fraser was a man of more than ordinary intelligence and of large religious experience, having come to a knowledge of the truth, when young, under the ministry of the late J. McLennan of Belfast and was at his death within ten days of completing eighty-four years. Mr. Fraser was throughout life an ardent supporter of every good cause, and for nine years held the office of Grand Chief of the British Order of Templars in its early history in this Province. He held the offices of Justice of the Peace, and commissioner of deeds and affidavits. He survived his partner, Margaret, youngest daughter of the late Gavin McLure, by twenty six years, and leaves one son, John W. on the homestead and three daughters, Mrs. James A. Campbell and Mrs. John N. McDonald, neighbors thereto, and Miss Maggie of Boston. In 1872 Mr. Fraser was ordained to the Eldership of the Presbyterian Church in Georgetown, which office he continued to hold in St. Andrew's Church, Montague. In this capacity he was highly esteemed by his brethren as a fellow counsellor and by all for his consistent life and fervent piety. He was particularly devoted to Sabbath School work, whenever opportunity afforded, up to the completion of four score years. On Saturday the 10th his remains were interred in the cemetery at Murray Harbor North, his brother elders acting as pall bearers. Thus has entered into rest one of the Lord's servants, ripened by age and experience.
