KING'S READING IS CENSORED.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Even Britishers occasionally come across queer royal restrictions that are new to them. For instance, it has only just come to light that King George is under official control in regard to the contents of his library.

No man in Britain is offered more new books than the English monarch, for the King's approbation of a new book is a substantial asset. But his majesty is not allowed to free hand, for the volumes offered for his acceptance have run the gauntlet of royal rule and regulation as interpreted by secretaries.

The other day, for example, an author sent the king a work of his own on a subject in which he is new to him to be personally presented. Much to his surprise, the book was returned with a note from a secretary regretting that it was impossible "consistently with the rule to lay before the King a book which contained any controversial matter." Chapter 20, "I am afraid, comes under that heading."

If King George had to rely on his secretaries for his library provender, he would be ill provided for, though as a matter of fact, he buys and reads what he likes, just like any other citizen. It is the more absurd that his gift literature should be thus censored. His private library at Windsor castle is particularly rich in works dealing with stamp collections, his only hobby.

ITALY'S QUEEN TRAINED NURSE.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The report that Queen Elena of Italy has been taking a prominent part in organizing a voluntary ambulance for Italy in the war with Turkey recalls how many well-known women in England have taken up nursing as a profession.

Lady Hermione Blackwood, a sister of the present Lord Dufferin, who has inherited many of the talents of her father, the late Marquis, and of her grandmother, who was a society beauty in her day, leads a quiet life and devotes herself to hospital work. She is president of the Irish Nursing Association. Others interested in nursing and who have taken an active part in the work are Lady Maud Keith-Falconer, sister to Lord Kintore; Lady Catherine Stanhope, sister to Lord Stanhope; Lady Rosalind Northcote, daughter of Lord and Lady Idelshire, and the Hon. Muriel Fraser, younger sister of Lord Lovat.

Lady Griselda Cheape, Lord Airie's aunt, used to act as nurse before her marriage, and so did Mrs. Bowen Colthurst, formerly Miss Rosalind Butler, the youngest daughter of Lord and Lady Dunboyne.

Final report of the meeting of the Health Board. I find in this report that there are in this city at present a large number of contagious diseases. Now Mr. Editor, will any fair-minded person dare say that these conditions are not due to the present sanitary conditions obtaining in Charlottetown? I think not. Notwithstanding the magnificent sewerage and water systems in this city today, the citizens are forced to the conclusion that their health, and the sanitary conditions surrounding them are not looked after as they should be. And whose fault is it? I will leave that to the citizens to answer.


For years back this city has had meagre sanitary inspection. Sanitary officers have been appointed with little or no salary. Their sanitary duties have been combined with other work, thus making it impossible to do either one thing or the other.

Mr. Editor, I would ask through the columns of your valuable paper these questions. viz.—Why is it we cannot have compulsory sewerage in Charlottetown? Is there any reason why owners of real estate in Charlottetown today can't be compelled to install the same?

It really seems absurd that it has not long ago been done. There is little doubt that if such were the case, such abominable sanitary conditions as are now existing in this city at the present time would be a thing of the past. When the adjourned meeting of the Health Board meets next Thursday, we will see to what extent they have the interests of the citizens at heart in this matter of better sanitary inspection, and the bringing forward of compulsory sewerage by owners, etc., etc.

Important Notice To Farmers And Buyers Regarding Thin Hogs

It will doubtless surprise you when we state that fully 50 p. c. of the hogs being marketed are altogether too thin, underfed and positively unfit for packing purposes and if this is continued the Pork business of P. E. I., will be seriously injured.

We fear the practice of selling and buying thin hogs has grown upon us unconsciously, because of the demand for meats cut from hogs 120 to 180 lbs, and in the desire to get hogs within those weights, we have overlooked what is of equal importance, namely the fact that hogs at any weight must be well fed, properly finished, thick and plump, otherwise there is no sale for the product.

We have done our best to make this generally known, yet the tendency to kill thin hogs seems to be greater at present than at anytime in the past, until today it is the exception to get hogs that are properly finished.

Finally for the protection of the industry, as well as in our own interest, we must positively refuse to receive from our buyers or of the market any hogs, no matter what weight, that are not put in good condition (fat and thick) and this is in the farmer's interest as the last two or three weeks feeding must be the most profitable.
