—Mystery Of Word 'Finl' Is Explained—VIENNA, Nov. 25 (AP)—The mystery of the word 'finl' stamped into the Alpine snow near the United States army plane which crashed last week in Switzerland was explained tonight when the 12 survivors arrived in Vienna.

—The word was spelled out as a request to the pilots of several pursuit planes who were bombing the transport to "please stop it. The vibrations of your engines are making the cracks in glacier larger."

—George Harvey, one of two unofficial heroes of the little band of people who survived, wrote the word. It was not until later that the people waiting for the rescue parties realized how the word might be interpreted.

—Survivors said there were cracks in the glacier on which they crashed and they knew of only one way to warn the planes away. Mr. Harvey said later he thought the word 'finl' would only be taken as a warning—not as a message that hope was gone.

Sentenced To Four Years In Penitentiary

Joseph Gallant, 32, Borden, P. E. I., commonly known as Joe Borden, was sentenced to four years in penitentiary on a charge of shopbreaking and two years in penitentiary for jail breaking.

The first charge was with reference to a break at the Borden Amusement Co., Borden, last August. The jail break took place while he was awaiting trial for this offence.

Before being sentenced he admitted to the court that he had served a term in penitentiary previously for causing bodily harm and had served a number of jail terms. He pleaded that he had been drinking the night he broke jail. He said in a statement, not under oath, that a boy had come to his cell window the night before and sold him a bottle of whiskey and a bottle of rubbing alcohol.

Judge Lewis said that it is regrettable that prisoners in jail are allowed contact with the outside and can be supplied from the outside.

Russell Ahearn, Borden, was sentenced to eight months in jail when he also pleaded guilty to jail breaking. Both prisoners had escaped together on November 8th when they assaulted the assistant jailer, took his keys and locked him in a cell. This was in addition to the balance of six months term for theft that he must complete.

Mr. W. E. Darby, K.C., represented the crown; Mr. C. D. McCallum represented Gallant, and Mr. Heath Strong, K.C., represented Ahearn.

Later Sheriff F. J. E. Wright told The Guardian that the window through which the prisoners claim to have purchased the liquor can be protected by a ten-foot steel fence but it might be possible for a boy to scale it after dark and not be seen, but it would be a very difficult enterprise.

Lewis To Stand Trial In Federal Court Wed.

By Clyde Blackburn WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (CP)—John L. Lewis today went to Federal Court and chose trial for contempt rather than obey an order to call off the strike of 400,000 soft coal miners which threatens to bring on the greatest labor crisis the United States has yet known.

His trial was scheduled for Wednesday morning but may take many days or weeks. Meanwhile the idleness of coal miners was forcing train-schedule reductions and a dimout in 21 states and the district of Columbia. It was affecting other industries and bringing idleness to many classes of workers not directly concerned with the mining of coal.

The bushy-browed leader of the United Mine Workers sat silent through a 39-minute session of the Federal District Court. His lawyer, Welly K. Hopkins told Judge Alan T. Goldsborough, "The defendants, respectively deny the jurisdiction of this court to issue a restraining order."

Thus the president and members of the U.M.W. replied to the court order issued on Mr. Lewis last Monday, telling him to rescind his notice to the miners and that their contract expired Wednesday.

Judge Goldsborough ruled that Mr. Lewis' indifference to the order was not a defence. He said Mr. Lewis and his followers "undertook to decide the law for themselves."

Stepping out of his judicial role for a moment, Judge Goldsborough expressed the hope that the unions would do nothing to influence Congress to enact legislation which might "set the labor movement back for years."

The 66-year-old mine workers' leader, facing the greatest battle of his career, replied in newspaper editorials and in certain radio broadcasts returned to the palatial union headquarters and shut himself up with advisors.

Says Probe Of British Press Political Move

MONTREAL, Nov. 25 (CP)—The proposed government press inquiry in Great Britain is a "political rump," Lord Camrose, proprietor and editor-in-chief of the London Daily Telegraph, said today in an interview.

"There is nothing secret about the ownership of a single newspaper in Great Britain," said Lord Camrose. "All the facts of ownership and control are publicly known and on this score there is nothing to enquire into. Curiously enough, it is only the socialist papers of which these details of actual ownership and control are not easily ascertainable."

Northern Graves Reveal Pottery 1,000 Years Old

THE PAS, Man., Nov. 25 (CP)—The origin of black pottery found in the graves of Indians and Eskimos in northern Manitoba but never made by them was one of many things which interested visitors to the province's hinterland during the summer.

Northern breeding grounds of migratory birds also came in for investigation by ornithologists as did the effect of sub-arctic weather on broadcasting and reception.

The theory submitted by I. Hollowell of Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History concerning the black pottery is that it came from tribes far to the south and east, and was traded among savages probably 1,000 years ago until finally it reached the northern stretches of Manitoba. The pottery is said to have been made long before white men reached the northland.

One of the largest deposits of these relics was examined by Hollowell last summer near Bersens River Ernest Menzies, a young British archaeologist who spent two years in the Duck Bay region prior to the war, also reported discovery of pottery among the ancient stone huts of the Eskimos.

Study Bird Migration Several ornithologists interested in the breeding grounds of migratory birds visited the north this year, including two experts from the United States government. Their recommendations assisted in determining the length of the shooting season in the Mississippi flyway states.

Other bird students include representatives of Ducks Unlimited, who indicated the organization hopes to construct new dams to maintain duck breeding zones.

Exploration by means of radar was done during the summer by a party of national research experts who sought to learn the effect of sub-arctic weather on broadcasting and reception. They were stationed for two months at the Clearwater Lake airbase.

The latest visitor was C. J. Albrecht, world-travelled naturalist from Homewood, Ill. He obtained six caribou for display in the Chicago and the Hastings, Ill., museums.

Mr. Albrecht described Canada's northern woods as a collector's paradise, and Canadians as being "most co-operative."

Gold Mine Strike At Noranda Continues

NORANDA, Que., Nov. 25 (CP)—Striking miners at the big Noranda Mines Limited property here today drew their back pay for the period Nov. 1-15, while pickets maintained their vigil at the main gate as the walkout continued in its fourth day.

The strike, to enforce demands for a 16-cent-an-hour wage increase retroactive to Feb. 8, a union checkoff and shift wage differentials, was called by Local 688, International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (I.O.), which claims 597 of the mine's 1,147 employees.

The company has offered a 10-cent-an-hour wage boost effective Nov. 1, but no union checkoff. Meanwhile, Albert Lafrance, president of the union local, said that "we are prepared for a long, long strike if need be."

In Toronto, James Y. Murdoch, company president, said production at the mine would continue.

The main smoke stack at the mine today emitted a thin wisp of smoke, but union spokesmen said no production was being carried on. Shift bosses and other maintenance men, however, are keeping fires going.

About 100 men have been permitted to go through the picket line so as to prevent the serious consequences which would result if the smelter fires were allowed to go out.
