Progress Made In Civic Health During Year 1934

Greater Public Interest In Health Services Cited As Encouraging Sign By City Health Officer.

A busy year for the City Health Department was reported to the City Council last night by Dr. B. C. Keeping, D.P.H., City Health Officer, whose report for the year 1934 was submitted as follows:

That the general public are taking greater advantage of the Public Health services is evidenced by the increasing numbers who avail themselves of chest examinations. During the year some 420 chest examinations were made on people presenting themselves at the Saturday morning clinic in the Provincial Sanatorium. In addition, 207 students entering Prince of Wales College and 43 students of St. Dunstan's University were examined for tuberculosis and other communicable diseases and those not already immunized against smallpox were vaccinated.

I am pleased to report that during the past year no serious epidemic visited the City. Sporadic cases of scarlet fever, measles, spinal meningitis and typhoid fever occurred but suitable quarantine measures were taken and the morbidity rate was kept at a minimum. In all, some 28 cases were reported.

In the Provincial Laboratory of the Public Health Department a large amount of work is done for the City along lines of diagnostic purposes for disease prevention. This work is steadily increasing each year. For some months past the City's water supply has been examined daily, except Sunday.

This service is much appreciated by all consumers and by the members of the Water Commission in particular. A full report of the laboratory service is appended.

Nursing Division

The Nursing Division has shown much activity during the year in the City Schools. When the schools re-open after the summer holidays a quick inspection of school children is made and children having certain skin conditions or communicable diseases are temporarily excluded. During the winter months physical examinations are done on the incoming children. Defects found are reported to the parents and corrections urged.

This necessitates much home visiting on the part of the nursing staff. Each year diphtheria immunizing clinics are held in each of the City public schools and many school and preschool children are given protection. In addition, vaccination clinics are held in the Provincial Sanatorium where all indigent children are vaccinated free of charge.

A full report of the work done by the Nursing Division appears elsewhere.

During the holiday season a Boys' Health Camp was organized at which some forty underprivileged boys attended. This camp was under the supervision of a Public Health Nurse. This camp was made possible by financial assistance rendered by both the Gyro and Rotary Clubs.

Only two cases of typhoid fever were reported and investigated but the source of infection could not be ascertained. One of the cases had been working in connection with a blocked sewer pipe and the probability is he got infected from that source.

Two cases of infantile paralysis developed during the autumn in the City. The source of infection was not ascertained.

Meat and milk consumed in the City were inspected by the Meat and Food Inspector, Dr. Croken, V.S., whose report appears elsewhere. Dairy herds supplying milk to the City are inspected as well as the barns and milking utensils, several times a year, and reported on by the Inspector.

Bake shops are also inspected by the Food Inspector.

The City's Sanitary Officer, James Bradley, makes regular inspections of restaurants, dwelling houses, stables, yards, privies, dumps, etc. His work is very extensive and is capably performed.

In conclusion permit me, Sir, to express my appreciation of the loyal support you and the members of the City Council have rendered both to myself and my staff in furthering Public Health work in the City.

Water Commissioners Show Operating Surplus Of Over \$21,519 In 1934

Revenue Up, Operating Costs Down, And A Substantial Nest-Egg For City Council. Duplicate Pumping Unit For Brackley And Use Of Electricity Or Fuel Oil At Malpeque Rd. Station, Recommended By Commissioners.

A transfer to the City Council of \$21,519.72, representing the excess of revenue over expenditure in the operations last year of the Commission of Sewers and Water Supply, was reported in the forty-seventh annual report submitted by Commissioners J. A. Webster, H. F. Connors and G. D. Wright at the City Council meeting last night. Both the gross and net receipts last year were the largest in the history of the Department.

A detailed report on the advantages of installing a duplicate pumping unit for Brackley and of changing one of the steam units at the Malpeque Road Station to electricity or fuel oil, it was intimated, would be submitted to the Council early this year.

Following is the text of the Commissioners' annual statement:

The building of asphalt streets on North River Road and McGill Avenue made it necessary to lay considerable main piping on these streets. The following extensions were completed during the year: 554 feet 6" water pipe on North River Road, 60 feet 4" water pipe on North River Road, 170 feet 4" water pipe on McGill Avenue, 146 feet 4" water pipe on Am-brose Street, 387 feet 4" water pipe on Green Street, 65 feet 4" water pipe on Greenfield Avenue, 574 feet 6" sewer pipe on North River Road, 170 feet 6" sewer pipe on McGill Avenue, 385 feet 6" sewer pipe on Green Street.

Receipts Largest In History

Both the gross and net receipts for 1934 are the largest the Department has ever experienced.

No debentures of any kind were issued for construction work during the year, but arrangements were made with the Royal Bank of Canada to issue an overdraft to pay for the extensions referred to earlier in this report. There is an overdraft in Water Construction (Capital) Account of \$3,136.63. When paying expense adjustments are completed there will be a refund of \$640.20 to this overdraft.

The Sewerage Construction (Capital) Account overdraft is \$1,364.38. There is a credit balance in House Connections Account of \$69.91.

Although there was considerable rainfall during the year the water level at over the Maritimes was maintained at a level which was in real difficulty through lack of water, but fortunately Charlottetown was well prepared to meet almost any emergency. The practice of letting water run in winter to prevent freezing continues to be one of our best practices. The advisability of immediately installing any service found running at night by our electric leak locator is being seriously considered.

DEFENCE MAKES FINAL PLEA FOR HAUPTMANN

Four courses will be open. Acquittal conviction with the death mandate, conviction with a mandatory life sentence or disagreement.

For hours Reilly talked on in the breathless, hushed atmosphere of the tiny, time-scarred courtroom. He began where Anthony M. Hauk, Jr., youthful Hunterdon County prosecutor, left off. It was Hauk's task to outline the state's evidence and he said it proved that Hauptmann alone, kidnapped and killed the baby on the night of March 1, 1932.

Hauptmann's color mounted as the young Hunterdon County prosecutor applied the verbal lash, weaving with words one of the chains the state hopes will fasten Hauptmann in the electric chair. When Reilly began his summation, Hauptmann's eyes blinked rapidly. Then his face became set. Apparently he brushed away a tear as he raised a finger to his cheek. Mrs. Hauptmann sat motionless. Her face mirrored little. Now and then a trace of anxiety settled and then passed.

With scathing emphasis, Reilly dwelt again on the names of Betty Gow, the baby's nurse; her deputy, the baby's nurse, the doctor, Dr. James F. Condon, the wife of the ransom payments; Violet Sharpe, the maid who killed herself; Isador Fisch, the dead little German who, Hauptmann says, "planted" the ransom on him.

Backstairs Job?

He pictured the kidnapping as a backstairs job with the ladder a "plant"; he envisaged "signals" involving Betty Gow, Johnson, and even Condon; he said the white-haired judge "stands behind something in this case that is unholy"; he charged Violet Sharpe with "a guilty heart and conscience."

"Condon," Reilly shouted, "I have no excuse for him, because Condon says with his lies and his gestures that as he went down the street the voice again said, 'over this way, Dok-ter.' Colonel Lindbergh didn't hear that."

"Who saw Condon hand the \$50,000 over the railing, or 'over a bush'? Nobody—nobody in God's world but Condon. Condon alone, always Condon alone."

Declaring Lindbergh was mistaken in his testimony about Hauptmann's voice, Reilly struck at the police activities, declaring policemen should have surrounded the cemetery where the ransom rendezvous was held.

Referring to that trust, Reilly said "I can't conceive of any father in the world who is about to come in contact with the person who is going to receive the money, that wouldn't be there on the spot and kill the dog as he took the money out of Condon's hands."

Unsound Evidence

Reilly said it was impossible that Col. Lindbergh, with the hum of aeroplane motors in his ears, had identified "with any degree of stability" the voice he testified was Hauptmann's.

Fisch, he said, was by no means "absolved," and he charged that the portion in the Main Station requiring replacement, is in first class condition.

Large Operating Surplus

The operating expenses were almost four hundred (\$470,000) dollars less than in 1933. With increased revenue and decreased expenditure we were able to transfer to the City Council the sum of \$21,519.72, an increase of \$2,551.38 over last year and the largest amount we have ever transferred. The amount paid over to the Council represents the excess revenue over expenditure for the year or other operating surplus. This money was used to pay interest and help provide a sinking fund for outstanding water works and domestic sewer debentures. The interest on water debentures for 1934 was \$10,395.00, and the interest on domestic sewer debentures was \$6,990.00, so that the surplus from this department was \$11,154.72 more than the interest on water and sewer debentures.

Analysis of System

It is difficult, if not impossible, to compare results from our Department with those of other cities without having access to the exact operating conditions and systems compared. We have a purely pumping system which involves a heavy expenditure for pumping while many Canadian and American cities have gravity systems with no pumping costs. Again the surplus from this Department, as stated, is used in paying interest and sinking the surplus from this department was \$11,154.72 more than the interest on water and sewer debentures.

"somewhere, in a safe deposit box" is hidden "that \$35,000 that Isador Fisch had."

Reilly closed his plea with praise for the jury and Justice Trenchard and a statement "I believe this man is absolutely innocent of murder."

"Whatever other charge there is against him in the Bronx will be disposed of. I don't think you are going to pick any cherries or chestnuts or anything else out of the fire for the district attorney of the Bronx."

He continued: "And I feel sure, in closing, ever Colonel Lindbergh wouldn't expect you and doesn't expect you to do anything but your duty under the law and under the evidence. May I say to him, in passing, that he has my profound respect and I feel sorry for him in his deep grief, and I am quite sure that all of you agree with him. His lovely son is now within the gates of Heaven."

Wilentz said he was prepared "and anxious" to begin the state's summation today but Justice Trenchard ordered the recess.

Inside Knowledge The florid Reilly inferred again and again that secrets of the kidnapping rested with those who had inside knowledge of the lonely Surland estate from which the baby was stolen.

Colonel Lindbergh was stabbed in the back," he cried out, "by the disloyalty of those who worked for him, and despite the fact that he courageously believes that there was no disloyalty in the servants' quarters. I say now that no one could get into that house unless the information was supplied by those who worked for Colonel Lindbergh."

"Who is hiding things here?" he shouted once. "Who is hiding the truth?"

Again he asked: "Red" Johnson brought back here? He entered the country illegally and he was allowed to go home. Why was the man that talked to Betty Gow while the Colonel was eating his dinner allowed to remain in the safety of Denmark?"

(Johnson actually is in Norway. A native of that country, he was deported for illegal entry after the kidnapping. Officials questioned him and satisfied themselves that he knew nothing of the crime.)

Kidnap Ladder Discussed Reilly dwelt in detail with the kidnap ladder, trying to cast doubt on every phase of the state's reconstruction of the crime. He attacked the handwriting experts, telling the jury to judge for themselves. He assailed parts of the state's evidence with a ferocity

which set the nerves of those who listened tingling as his strong voice rolled through the courtroom. Freed from the restrictions of the rules of evidence, he made one blunt accusation after another. He evoked pity and terror, he brought the spectators to their feet as he spoke in a voice choked with emotion, of the finding of the baby's body and the treatment accorded it by the police.

"Among his accusations of "framed" evidence Reilly included the timekeeper's book of the New York apartment project where Hauptmann had worked. It contained "a nice little plant," he said. The ladder, he cried, "never was made by a carpenter. It's been knocked down, put together, and photographed. Those were planted photographs, planted in a telegraph office. You planted to get you to send this man to the electric chair."

"I don't believe the board ever was in the attic," he shouted, as he attacked the state's evidence that a rail of the kidnap ladder was sawed from Hauptmann's attic flooring in the Bronx.

"I'm afraid this board was prepared for this trial." He assailed Arthur J. Koehler, Government wood expert who traced the ladder wood to Hauptmann, as testifying for glory, for vanity, for advancement.

"I don't see how he can sleep at night after giving that testimony when a man's life is at stake," Reilly cried. "And as 'plant No. 999' he assailed Hildegard Olga Alexander, who said she saw Hauptmann spying on Condon in a telegraph office. "A dizzy young lady from the Bronx looking for a movie contract," he shouted. Colonel Lindbergh sat motionless through most of the long day.
