AMERICAN GUNBOAT HAS NINE CASES OF YELLOW FEVER.
WASHINGTON, Feb 6—With nine men aboard ill with yellow fever, the American gunboat Marietta is now on her way from Puerto Cortez, Honduras, to Key West (Fla.). She sailed from Central American waters under orders from the navy department which were issued as soon as the officials here were advised that the stricken men were suspected of having yellow.

"CHEAPER THAN WATER."
That "souless monopoly," the Standard Oil Company, which has so long been engaged in robbing the American people ("drinking up their hearts' blood," is we believe the usual expression) its agents at retail in the streets of Hartford for eight cents a gallon—eight cents delivered at your house and call again for the can when it is empty. The price of gasoline at retail is now twelve cents a gallon and the wholesale price is considerably less.

Now if the Connecticut River could be converted tomorrow into a stream of "Poland spring water" it would not pay anybody to bottle it up and deliver it to buyers at eight cents a gallon. Yet the Standard Oil Company has forced down the price of this indispensable fuel and illuminant to a kind of a "Poland spring water" such a thing is made possible only by doing business on an immense scale and by allowing the law of supply and demand to operate unfettered by government control.

In no other country in the world are the petroleum products sold at the low rates which prevail throughout this country. In Great Britain there is now a government tax of 25 cents or more on every gallon of gasoline that is sold, and automobilists who use the roads of France, Germany and Italy are made to pay "all kinds of prices" for the fluid which operates their motors. In this country the use of gasoline has been enormously increased within the past five years by the use of automobiles. It was generally supposed that as the number of these vehicles began to increase at the rate of more than 100,000 a year the price of gasoline would certainly be forced up. But the price has gone down instead of up, with enhanced demand, just as has been always the case since "Standard Oil methods" were first applied to the petroleum industry.

Yet Mr. Roosevelt, when he was president, ignoring all the essential facts sent a special message to congress in denunciation of the Standard Oil Company. This message was written merely as an expression of an ignorant popular outcry then prevalent, against the company, started by the muckrakers. We are noticing these matters now because while every newspaper in the country eagerly gives a prominent place to any kind of a political or other attack on the Standard Oil Company we have seen nowhere a single line of publicity in regard to their latest reduction in the price of the world's most useful and necessary illuminant.

HAWAIIANS DYING OUT.
One of the few illustrations of the absorption of a race and the creation of a new one is going on in Hawaii, the fact being vividly brought out in the last census statistics. The Hawaiians, who have inhabited the islands for three or four centuries and who at one time numbered millions, have dwindled to less than 30,000. Big, muscular, easy-going as they are, the Hawaiians lack the vitality to stand the whirl of modern civilization and the vicious habits which they derive from it. So far no edicts have been able to stop the ravages of tuberculosis and alcohol.

The census figures, by showing that the pure Hawaiian blood decreased by 3,088 in 10 years, set forth other interesting information. In those ten years in which the full-blood race suffered so heavily, the part-Hawaiians increased by 5,000. In 1900, when Uncle Sam took the first census of the islands, there were 7,848 persons of this description and in 1910 this number has grown to 12,485, which is only a little less than half of those of pure blood.

As the Hawaiian blood becomes absorbed more and more into the white race, however, the steadiness of the "haole" becomes added to the massiveness of the old Hawaiians, and in many respects the new race is a fine one indeed. What it will develop in 10 or 20 years from now is interesting to the islands as it is material.

CITY OF LOST CONTINENT DISCOVERED
BERLIN, Feb. 5—Dr. Leo Frobenius claims to have discovered one of the lost cities of Atlantis of the ancients in Southern Nigeria. He is an Atlantis enthusiast, who has long been convinced that the lost kingdom was not mythical, but was located in West Africa. Letters from Dr. Frobenius, who is in West Africa, bearing various dates in December and January, have been received by friends here declaring that he has proved the correctness of his theory. He says: "I have made an incredible discovery. I have found in West Africa traces of a high and extremely ancient urban civilization. I have unearthed wonderfully worked quartz pillars, remains of granite figures, burned clay portraits of classic beauty and vessels and fragments of pottery splendidly overlaid with various colors. My chief discovery was of a hollow bronze bust of a head covered with fine tattooing. I have thus proved in the broadest sense that my Atlantis theory is correct."


