—SERBS STRUGGLE TO RECOVER LOST LAND
NEW YORK, Nov. 24—Reviewing operations in the Balkans the military expert of the "Sun" says:
The reports from the Macedonian front show that the Serbians are making a valiant struggle to recover their lost land. The shattered and broken army that fled across the Albanian mountains and found a refuge on the island of Corfu was so completely restored to strength that General Sarrail entrusted it with the most important position on the western front. It justified the confidence by driving the Bulgar-German forces from their defences on the Cerna River and preparing the way for the capture of Monastir.
The situation in the Balkans made aggressive action by General Sarrail's force imperative. The Rumanians have been gradually driven back on the Transylvania frontier, and their retreating army is in grave peril of being captured by General Von Falkenhayn, who advancing from the west, has already reached Craiova, the capital of Western Wallachia. Their losses here have not been compensated by the gains in Dobruja.
The Rumanians have made a stubborn resistance, which has so far saved their country and proved of great value to the Allies by necessitating the weakening of the Teutonic defence on other fronts. But despite this the union of the Austro-German forces on the north with the army of Von Mackensen menaces their country. Rumania subjugated, the security of the Central Powers' position in the Balkans would be increased, the Russian left flank imperilled and the Bulgarians resistance strengthened. Macedonia has for its evident purpose a co-operation with the Russian forces fighting its way south through the Dobruja. This plan would carry with it the acquisition of the lower Danube, the control of the Orient railway and the trapping of Bulgarian between the two armies. But its accomplishment must depend largely upon the ability of the Rumanians to drive Von Mackensen from the Dobruja and at the same time increase the Rumanian resistance.
