King Drives By Pioneer Trails At West's Gate

PROGRESS FOR ROYAL GUESTS IN WINNIPEG INCLUDES HONORS MARKING EARLY AND MODERN HISTORY OF PRAIRIES.

Winnipeg, April 14—(CP) Old Fort Garry, near the Red and Assiniboine rivers of Indian fame; Winnipeg's city hall, a grey stone pile with a colorful history back to the early 80's; and Deer Lodge, home of Lord Strathcona, whose acres now form one of the city's most modern suburbs, are among the landmarks associated with the pioneer days of the prairie west on the route arranged for the King and Queen in Winnipeg, May 24th.

Here on the holiday celebrated in Canada for 100 years, in honor of his Majesty's great-grandmother, Queen Victoria—the Indians' "Great White Queen." Following luncheon at Government House as guests of Lieutenant Governor W. J. Tupper and Mrs. Tupper, the King and Queen will ride to the parks where thousands of war veterans and school children will greet them.

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Charting War Games Off New England's Coast PROVIDENCE AIRPORT Army support for Blue forces, under Major-General Drum, will have headquarters here. Being "flying fortresses" and Douglas bombers will strengthen defense. BOSTON NAVY YARD Headquarters of Rear Admiral Tarrant, commander of naval unit of Blue defense. Coast Guard ships and planes will try to check Black attack. BLACK RAIDERS Detachment of fleet under Rear Admiral Johnson will attempt to "destroy" isolated ships of Blue fleet, cripple shipping, seize coastal towns. NARRAGANSETT BAY Center of naval aerial operations, under Rear Admiral Blakely. Under his command will be 48 long-range patrol planes which can fly 3000 miles without refueling. ATLANTIC OCEAN BLUE FLEET Theoretically steaming peacefully northward from Caribbean Sea, its vessels entering various ports south of New York for refueling. Scale of Miles 0 50 100 In this "war zone," co-operation between U. S. military and naval forces gets a thorough test late in April. Shaded area on map is most important section of mock "battleground" extending from New England shoreline eastward 400 miles into Atlantic. Planes and ships will be combined in defensive "Blue" efforts to protect American coastal centers, bottle up attack by "Blacks." Approximately 16 naval vessels, 100 to 175 aircraft, and several Coast Guard ships will participate in the maneuvers.
