1000 PER CENT. IN FOXES.—Rosemont Live Stock Company, Ltd., ranchers of pure bred silver black foxes, is considering a proposition of amalgamation with a large concern which, if put through, as is practically certain it will, will give the shareholders 1,000 per cent. Of this amount 500 per cent. will be paid in cash and 500 in stock in the amalgamation. While the deal is not actually closed all that is now necessary is the formal signing of the agreement. There has been great demand for the stock from the United States, cheques being received from such distant places as Pueblo, Colorado and Idaho. HANDSOME TROPHY.—There is at present on exhibit in the large show window of the MacKinnon Drug Co., Kent and Great George Streets, Charlottetown, an unusually handsome shooting trophy. It has been presented by Senator William Dennis, of the Halifax Herald and Evening Mail, and is for competition among teams of eight of the various units of the Sixth Division of the Canadian Militia, which comprises the Forces in the Maritime Provinces. The competition is to take place at Halifax at the beginning of next month. The trophy takes the shape of a really splendid shield, consisting of a handsome design of bronze of an oak leaf design, a noble lion reclines royally, beneath him being two crossed rifles over a smaller shield encircled by a smaller shield encircled by a belt of cartridges. On each side of that smaller shield stands the figure of a rifleman in full military outfit, while upon it is the following inscription: "Presented by Senator William Dennis, 1913, for annual team competition in the 6th Division at Halifax, N. S." Such a gift is worthy of the highest commendation, having as it does the notable object of not alone promoting rifle shooting, among the Forces, but creating a rivalry that while being healthy is bound to have a beneficial effect on the efficiency at the range of the various units engaged. The conditions of the competition are as follows:—The Dennis Trophy is to be shot for at the Bedford Range, Halifax, October 1st, 1913. Teams to be composed of eight members of any unit in the 6th Division. A unit may enter more than one unit team. Ranges, 500, 600, 800 and 900 yards. Rules of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association are to govern. Each team is to provide its own ammunition; any ammunition suitable for the service Rifle is permissible. Entrance fee, \$1 per man; to cover necessary expenses, including medals for winning team. Committee:—Lt. Col. Flowers, R. O.; Major A. H. H. Powell, D.A.A. & Q.M.G., 6th Div.; Capt. W. W. P. Gibson, D.A.A. & Q.M.G., Halifax Fortress. The entries close this month, and are to be addressed to the D.A.A. & Q.M.G., Halifax, and must be accompanied by entrance fee. The trophy is being exhibited throughout the Maritime Provinces. It was received here from Sydney and will be sent from Charlottetown to Truro.
