NORTH PINETTE BRIDGE.—Any one crossing over this new bridge will see one of the finest bridges on the Island. The longest excepting the Hillsborough, on the Island, it is 1,000 feet long, the walls are of Island hemlock 114,000 feet, 250 piles, 25,000 yards of clay to fill in the sides, 20 tons of rock and bolts, also 4,000 feet of railing. It took 33 men to complete the work in 10 weeks. This bridge is a credit to the MacMillan Government, also to the contractor and manager, Mr. D. A. McDonald and inspector, Mr. J. R. Ross.

Poultry Show

A meeting of the Prince Edward Island Poultry Association was held in the Agricultural Hall Wednesday evening. The main business of the evening was to discuss the advisability of holding a poultry show this year. Owing to the fact that the last two years the association had not been able to hold their annual show it was thought that every effort should be made to

hold one this year. After a prolonged discussion on the affair it was decided that the association would hold a Poultry Show in early January of 1935, and owing to space and coops available some of the classes may have to be eliminated for this year. Poultry and poultry products have held their own during 1934 and the poultry on Prince Edward Island compares favorably with that of any of the other provinces. With this in mind the association

expect this year to have one of the largest shows ever held, and hope to have more entries from Prince and Kings County than formerly. Arrangements are also being made to allot spaces for commercial firms to exhibit poultry feeds and appliances.

The attendance of other years has been small compared with the education value of a poultry show has to the public. There can be seen the different breeds that represent the Island poultry and also explanation will be given on characteristics of poultry as to laying qualities and what constitutes good table fowl.

Effort is being made to have some form of entertainment each evening of the show.

Texture And Flavour of Cheese

In the making of all cheese, with some minor exceptions, rennet is used as a coagulating agent, says the Why and How to Use Cheese bulletin issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. The factors which influence texture and flavor, and thus produce the different types, are the age of the milk at the beginning of the process, the degree of heat employed at different stages, the amount of moisture retained, the time of salting, and the handling of the curd during the early part of the process. The texture depends largely on the amount of moisture retained, while the flavor is determined by the kind of fermentation which is encouraged.

Eel-Grass Return Greatly Welcomed

LIVERPOOL, N. S., Dec. 13 (CP).—Eel-grass, which disappeared almost entirely from shores on both sides of the North Atlantic two years ago, is returning in Nova Scotia. Port Joli and Port L. Herbert, near here, report the grass abundant again and fishermen say it is free from the disease which has been destroying this valuable weed.

A theory has been advanced in England that a parasitic organism causes the disappearance of the grass, masses of a lower organism invading the cells of the diseased eel-grass plants.

The district surrounding Port Joli and Port L. Herbert is one of the best feeding grounds and sanctuaries in the province for geese and other wild birds and the return of the grass was very welcome.

Farmers in this vicinity are banking their houses with the grass against the winter frosts and spreading it on their fields, to be used as fertilizer next year.

It has been reported that grass along other shores is diseased and ducks and geese are scarce as a result but that is not true of this part
