S. S. Mataroa Due April 4th

HALIFAX, N.S., March 25—The last two regiments expected to return home as complete units are scheduled to arrive in Halifax for the West Indies on the "Mataroa" due to dock on April 4th according to information received today by the Canadian National Railways.

Thirty-two officers and 604 others will carry their homes are in Halifax, 57 in Montreal, 20 in Quebec, 58 in Toronto, 52 in Winnipeg, 12 in Calgary and the remainder 59 in Brockville.

MONTEREAL, Que., March 25 (AP)—T. E. Fringie, passenger traffic manager, Canadian National Railways, Chicago, died suddenly yesterday, according to word received here today at company headquarters.

Mr. Fringie, 56, was born at Huntington, Ont., and entered the service of the Canadian National Railways as city passenger and ticket agent at Winnipeg in 1911.

He became general agent at Montreal in 1928, and two years later was transferred to his present position as general agent of the Canadian National Grand Trunk Railway and as general agent of the Central Vermont Railway. He was appointed acting passenger traffic manager at Chicago in 1943.

Mr. Fringie is survived by his wife, a son and daughter. The funeral will take place in Chicago tomorrow.

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FISHERIES COUNCIL OF CANADA TO MEET

The first annual meeting of the Fisheries Council of Canada will take place in Ottawa at the Chateau Laurier on March 27th.

The Council was organized in January 1946 with Mr. G. J. Morrow, Lunenburg, N. S., President; Mr. J. S. Eckman, Vancouver, B. C., Vice-President; and Olive Flanta, Ottawa, Secretary-Manager.

Directors of the organization are: the Province of British Columbia—J. M. Buchanan, S. M. Rosenberg, J. S. Nicholas, and W. C. Ross; the Province of Ontario—Roy Ross; for the Province of Quebec—Louis T. Blais; for the Maritime Provinces—H. G. Donner, H. Zwicker and Hon. A. N. McLean; and for the Prairie Provinces—G. F. Johnston. Directors representing wholesale trade are Frank James, Toronto for Eastern Canada, and for the last three, Winnipeg or Western Canada.

The outstanding event of the two day meeting will be the presentation to the Hon. E. F. G. Bridges, Minister of Fisheries, of an international agreement received by the Prime Minister for transmission to the Secretary General of the United Nations. The agreement will embody a resolution signed by the Council representatives committing the Government to the Charter of United Nations.

The presentation will take place at a luncheon meeting presided over by the Hon. Paul Martin, Secretary of State and Canada's first representative to the Economic and Social Council of United Nations, which will address the gathering on some aspects of UNO and its general and subsidiary organizations. The Hon. Mr. Martin was appointed Canadian delegate to the United Nations, December, 1945, and was Chairman of the Canadian Delegation for the last three weeks of the Economic and Social Council of UNO, January.

Will Address Luncheon

Mr. Charles E. Jackson, general manager of the National Fisheries Institute, Washington, D. C., will address the luncheon meeting of the Council on Tuesday, March 26th. Mr. Jackson was for some time Director of the National States Game and Wild Life Department, and is a member of the Executive Committee of the International Commission for Reconstruction and Market Extension.

As the industry depends upon export markets for sale of seventy per cent of the average annual Canadian production, the elimination of trade barriers, concessions in foreign tariffs and reciprocal concessions in Canadian tariffs, the elimination of non-tariff impediments to trade and the development of new markets will be the main topics in the deliberations.

Regulations under the Fish Inspection and the Meat and Poultry Inspection Acts, and domestic allocations of canned fish under the Combined Food Board, and the Fish Inspection and the Meat and Poultry Inspection Acts, will be discussed.

Other topics to be discussed are: the recent duty imposed upon diesel engines and the Government will make plans for control of all Canadian customs duties on the gear and equipment imported for use in the fisheries.

Ocean Fisheries

The Council will also consider problems relating to the ocean fisheries contiguous to the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and the proposed treaty under which an International Fisheries Commission of the Great Lakes is being suggested.

RHUBARB SAUCE

Wipe rhubarb and cut into 1-inch lengths. Measure, then cover with boiling water and let stand 5 minutes. Drain and cook without water until tender in the top of a double boiler. Add two tablespoons sugar for each cup of uncooked rhubarb and stir gently until sugar is dissolved. If carefully watched, rhubarb may be cooked over direct "low" heat.

REUBARB WHIP

1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin 1 1/4 cup cold water 2 cups hot, stewed, sweetened rhubarb 1 tablespoon lemon juice 2 egg whites

Soak gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Add to hot rhubarb and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice. Place in refrigerator or other cool place and allow to partially set. Beat egg whites with salt until stiff, but not dry. Add the jelled mixture and continue to beat. Turn into one large or several individual moulds and chill. Serve with custard sauce made from the two egg yolks. Six servings.

WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

D. D. T. Saves Asters From Insect-Borne Disease

Thanks to the army insecticide, D. D. T., asters which once were raised among the three most popular flowers, may be on their way back to the garden this year.

For years they have suffered from an insect-borne virus disease called aster yellows, which was carried from host plants by a pestiferous insect known as the leaf hopper. This is a tiny jumping and flying pest which does not eat leaves, but drinks plant juices.

The aster yellows, which has been found which has never been found which would control it, until D. D. T. was tried. When dusted on the plants, the insecticide stays there until the insects, which swarm on the gardener's approach, come to rest. These D. D. T. strikes them, through their feet, and soon there are no leaf hoppers, or at least none which is prevalent in some sections, has been overcome by breeding with resistant varieties; but against the yellow remedy had been found, except to grow the flowers in a cloth house, or under glass, which would exclude the leaf hoppers.

Because the plants grow slowly, they are usually better protected to give an earlier harvest. But if you are willing to wait, the aster yellows, which would exclude the leaf hoppers.
