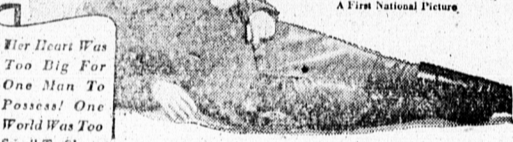

Session Topped Busy Year For Quebec M.L.A.'s

QUEBEC, Nov. 26 (CP)—Paralleled by a continuing probe of public accounts that stole the spotlight from the Quebec legislature's more formal procedure, a brief and brisk session of that body climaxed this province's crowded political year.

Highlights of the period were: The unremitting attack of Union Nationale—a fusion party—under Hon. Maurice Duplessis, on administration of public funds by the government of L. A. Taschereau.

Consequent resignation of the Taschereau government last June, and defeat of the succeeding administration led by Adelard Godbout.

Rise of Duplessis, former Conservative leader, whose followers inflicted on Quebec Liberalism its first defeat in 49 years.

Passage in special session of a legislative program which included acts designed to cut down expenses, and to reform the electoral law.

Resumption of the Public Accounts Committee's probe into handling of money under the defeated government.

Taking up the Premiership after his party's 74-16 election victory Aug. 17 Mr. Duplessis called a special session in October. Forty-five bills passed before prorogation early in November included:

Troops Testing Union Strength To Newer China

(Canadian Press) SHANGHAI, Nov. 26—Manchoukuan troops marching into the northern province of Suiyan are testing the strength of a China which today faces Japan with increasing resolution.

At Nanking the military dictatorship of General Chiang Kai-Shek is conceded by many observers to be the strongest government Chinese have known since the Manchou dynasty toppled from the Dragon Throne in 1911.

Until the autumn of 1931 China was notoriously split up among war lords and provincial leaders, but until Japan occupied Manchuria in that year most of the sectionalism was of Chinese origin.

Now there is apparently immensely less disunity among the Chinese themselves, their present territorial divorce arising rather from extension of foreign dominance.

The strong man of the Nanking government is the Dictator, General Chiang Kai-Shek, under whom the people are showing signs of unification in racial ideas and emotions.

Many Chinese leaders say that if his life were to end suddenly, China would go back to internal chaos and sectionalism.

Territories over which Nanking has no control are: Manchurian provinces and Jehol, organized as the Empire of Manchoukuo, 496,533 square miles.

Outer Mongolia, a Soviet Republic for more than a decade, 622,744 square miles.

Sinkiang or Chinese Turkestan, adjoining Outer Mongolia, 633,802 square miles. Russian influence is paramount and Sinkiang even refused to allow Nanking's airplanes to land within its borders.

Tibet, which does not recognize Nanking's sovereignty, where no Chinese administration may be set, and where no taxes are collected by the Chinese government, 349,419 square miles.

Subtraction of these territories leaves China with 2,211,938 square miles and alienates a population of 41,000,000. It removes thirty-populated regions which might have taken immigration from crowded parts of China.

In addition, "autonomy" with Japanese backing, is claimed for the five northern provinces of Hopei, Chahar, Suiyan, Shansi and Shantung, and has already seriously impaired Nanking's authority in these five provinces with an area of 390,000 square miles and a population of 90,000,000.

Szechwan is somewhat newly under Nanking's military domination, but the war lords there are not reconciled and might cause future trouble.

Dispute Nanking Rule Kwangsi, brains of the Southwest rebellion last summer, is still defiant of Nanking's authority. Yunnan and Kweichow are both friendly to Kwangsi leaders and if Nanking had attacked Kwangsi in August or September, it is believed these two provinces would have rebelled.

Szechwan, Kwangsi, Yunnan and Kweichow have a combined area of 462,738 square miles and a population of 89,000,000 and if they with the northern "autonomy" provinces are subtracted, the Nanking government has left under its rule 1,359,200 square miles and a population of 200,000,000.

Two more provinces are in a "special position." Kwangtung, with Canton as its capital, an area of 86,426 square miles and 36,000,000 people, was in open rebellion until last July. Nanking has its own customs, railway and other officials there, and its own appointee as governor, but the Kwangtung provincial armies are not friendly toward the Central government.

In Fukien, 46,737 square miles with a population of 10,700,000,

Japan has long claimed a "special position" because of its proximity to the island of Formosa, 80 miles away. If war came between Japan and China it is believed Japan would quickly occupy Fukien.

To add to these complications, Communist armies still roam over a large part of Szechwan and Chinese "Reds" are well entrenched in parts of Shensi and Kansu and threaten the borders of Suiyan.

While such a divided China might be considered to have little chance against Japan, the view is also taken that in many places where Japan now holds virtual domination, she would find millions of people in open hostility to her in case of war. War, many think would narrow the "Japanese zone of influence" to areas actually occupied by Japanese troops or within range of Japan's warships.

Japan could quickly blockade and capture China's seaports and occupy her coastal cities, but China could conceivably keep up a guerrilla warfare for years which might seriously drain Japan's sources in money and man power.

Fish Fillers

Canada has a per capita fish production of 120 pounds, and a per capita fish consumption of only 20.7 pounds. These figures show that Canadians are not getting their share of their own fish—which thanks to the purity and coldness of our northern waters—is the finest flavored in the world.

The annual per capita consumption of poultry and meats in Canada is over 160 pounds—or about eight times that of fish. Canadians, it would seem are cheating themselves out of their natural heritage by not eating more of Canada's fine-flavored fish.

The per capita fish production of Great Britain is 40 pounds, of Norway, 70 pounds, of New York City, 35 pounds, of the West Indies, 33 pounds, and of Canada, where the finest flavored fish in the world are produced, only 21 pounds!

The per capita consumption of eggs in Canada is approximately 40 pounds (30.9 dozen per annum), or about double that of fish. Surely this fact is nothing to crow over!

Canadians serve fish at only nine meals a month on the average. This indicates that we are not getting our proper share of Canadian Fish and Shellfish—fresh, frozen, canned, smoked, dried, pickled—nutritive, health - guardian and ready to the housewife's hand in teeming variety.

There are only slight differences in the apparent consumption of fish by the various income classes in Canada. But those with the highest incomes appear to eat the most fish. This is not because fish is expensive, but may be because, so far, only the better off among us have had time to become connoisseurs of fine flavors and fine foods!
