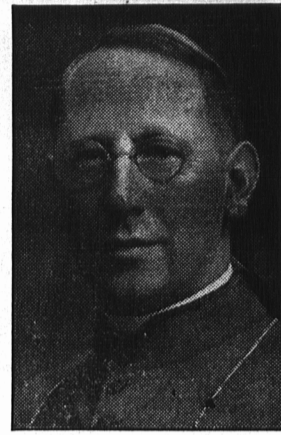

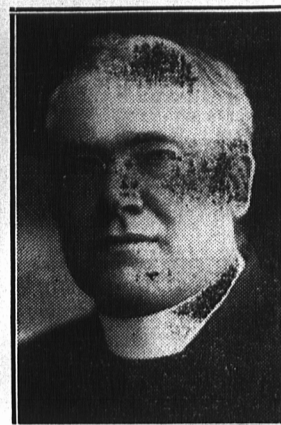
Freeland, Lot 11. He was a successful farmer at Conway and most highly respected citizen and his death is deeply deplored in the community. He was a member of the Anglican Church.

### Large Increase In Stature & Weight Of Canadian Children

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—(CP)—Canadian children—taller and heavier than those in England, Scotland and the United States—continue to gain in stature, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics revealed today.

The Bureau report makes comparisons between surveys conducted in 1925 and 1939 and finds "a remarkable increase" in the stature and weight of children during the 16 years.

"It is found that the excess height of children in 1939 over 1925 amounts to from one to two inches between the ages of seven and 13," said the report.

"A five-year-old boy in 1939 was 8 of an inch taller on the average than a boy of the same age in 1925, while a five-year old girl is one-half inch taller.

"This variation increases steadily with age up to a point where a 14-year old boy of today is as tall as a 15-year old in 1925 and a 13-year old girl today is only about one-half inch shorter than a 15-year old girl in 1925.

"Weight, it is found, follows the same general trends as height."

The report was prepared by the Bureau in co-operation with the Toronto hospital for sick children, and the Toronto department of health. The survey covered children ranging in age from five to 15 years and provided an up-to-date table of average heights and weights for Canadian school children, superseding a record based on the 1923 survey.

The report said Canadian school children are considerably taller and heavier than average English and Scottish children, and slightly taller and heavier than American children.

"The influence of environmental factors on the build of children was studied.

The report said: "Some factors which are found to affect the build of children are: The occupation of the father, whether the family is or is not assisted by direct relief, whether the school which the child attends is located in a relatively poor or a relatively prosperous district, the birthplace of the parent and the physical defects of the child."

An analysis of the academic standing of the child revealed that normal, that is nearly physically perfect children are more advanced in school grade than are abnormal children.

### IT DIDN'T PAY TO PLAY LIONS

LONDON, Aug. 29—(CP)—Two small English boys know now that it doesn't pay to muddle with lions or lion tames. Eight-year-old Vernon Head of Bristol came off second best when he climbed into the lion's enclosure at a zoo. A frightened lioness, usually "tame as a kitten," mauled him so severely he was taken to hospital in a critical condition.
