MONCTON, Nov. 26—During the Canadian National railways trans-continental hour on Thursday, commencing at 11.20 p. m., Atlantic standard time, Athens Buckley, mezzo soprano, will appear before the microphone as guest artist. LEGION CONSIDERS EX-SERVICE MEN

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 23—(By M. McIntyre Hood, Canadian Press Special Staff Representative)—What is to be done with the Canadian ex-service man who, while not suffering from disability which can be classed as pensionable, breaks down in physique and spirit because of the drain of his physique while on active service? This is one of the big questions which will occupy the attention of the Dominion convention of the Canadian Legion when it assembles here from Nov. 25 to 28. For three years now the experts at legion headquarters have been studying this problem, and it is likely some important recommendations will be submitted for the consideration of the convention, to be passed on to the dominion government, if approved.

It was as a result of the study of this question made by the Canadian Legion service bureaux at Ottawa, Toronto, London and elsewhere that the Dominion parliament, in 1922, appointed a special parliamentary committee to deal with returned soldiers' problems, a committee so impressed by the evidence presented that 28 amendments were made to the Pension Act in that session of the House of Commons.

In its report, the 1922 parliamentary committee admitted that the problem of the burnt-out man was the most serious facing the department of pensions and national health, for the reason that in most cases pensionability cannot be established, and under the present regulations there is no way in which these men and their families can be provided for. Yet thousands of them are breaking down, burnt-out and aged prematurely by their war service, and unable to continue in the ranks of labor.

The Ontario Provincial Command has presented several resolutions, passed by its provincial convention held at St. Thomas, in July, to be forwarded to the Dominion convention. The most far-reaching of these is a recommendation that free hospital treatment and care be provided for all ex-service men who break down in health, irrespective of whether or not they are pensioners. Under the present regulations free treatment and hospital care are provided only for pensioners, or for men who have a recurrence for some admitted war disability. The Ontario proposal, which will be strongly supported on the floor of the convention, would extend these benefits to all ex-service men whose health, physical or mental, has broken down owing to their weakened powers of resistance to disease.

Making Whiskey At Home

Says Halifax Chronicle:—It has long been thought to be illegal in Nova Scotia that it was illegal to manufacture intoxicating liquors, without a license, and many have been brought into court for the making of so-called "moonshine." It is somewhat startling, therefore, to find pamphlets being distributed from house to house in Halifax and Dartmouth with the title "A practical treatise on the manufacture of liquors, syrups and brandy at home," published by a company of France and endorsed by a Canadian company. Different homes have found these pamphlets at their doors. Is this within the law, or is the law of so little consequence that it is to be treated with indifference?

Live Stock Market

MONTRÉAL, Que., Nov. 26—There were 463 cattle, 172 calves, 782 hogs and 322 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets here today. The cattle offered were common cows and heifers. Sales were made slowly at about steady prices. Common bulls were firm at \$4.50 to \$5. Calves were mostly all veals and were sold for \$12.50 to \$14, with a few choice at \$15.

Lambs were unchanged. Ewes and wethers were sold for \$11 to \$11.25. The bulk of the sheep brought around \$5.

Hogs were about steady at \$11.75 for bacon fed and watered. The bulk of the hogs were sold flat. Odd sales were made at \$11.50 flat. Sows were unchanged graded price \$11.75 for bacon, \$1 per hog premium on selects and 50 cents, \$1, \$2 and \$3 per hog of butchers' lights, heavies and extra heavies.
