The Maritime Merchant of Halifax says: George Laidlaw has just returned from Prince Edward Island. He says the conditions are favourable to a good fall business and that they would have been better had the weather permitted farmers to harvest all their crops.

John E. Cameron of the Prince Edward Island Railway, who was in town visiting his parents, Alexandra and Mrs. Cameron, left for his home in Charlottetown last week Mr. Cameron had been in Moncton attending a meeting of the Boiler-makers' Union. D. Darrach, proprietor of Reuben Taylor & Co., Kennington, deplures to the Maritime Merchant, the unsatisfactory conditions that too often prevail in connection with transportation facilities between the island and the mainland during the winter months. He is not pessimistic, however, and believes that it is only a question of time before satisfactory conditions will obtain.

The Charlottetown market yesterday was well attended and large quantities of ducks, geese and fowl were to be had. The prices were if anything a little lower as the market was so well supplied. Butter sold at 25 and 30 cents, eggs, 24 cts, ducks up to \$1.25 per pair while geese sold all the way from 75 cts to \$1.85. Carts of potatoes and oats and other produce lined Sunnyside all day while the following prices were realized:—Oats 46 cts, potatoes, 25 cents; turnips, 11 cents; hay \$1.00 per hundred weight; and straw \$3.50 per load. Pork was bringing 75 cents for the best.

There will be a large reduction in the out of lumber in New Brunswick this fall and winter. There are two or three very good reasons for this course. In the first place the British market has sharply declined from the prices of the early part of the season, and is also well stocked. Shippers have sustained losses and there is no present desire to tempt the market further. Very large quantities are held on this side. Then the price of supplies is high, and the wet season has made it very difficult to get teams and supplies into the woods. One operator has asserted that the cut on the upper St. John will be only about half that of last year. A large firm dealing in mill machinery states that there will be a much smaller number of portable mills at work this year than usual. The operators are making preparations to overcome dull markets by reducing the supply.

"All the efforts of the packers, express and the government agricultural teachers seem to have availed little in the matter of increasing the production of hogs in this province so far," said J. F. Fraser, of Davis & Fraser, when seen at his new office on Lockman Street, Halifax a few days ago. "I doubt very much," said he, "whether the total hog crop in Nova Scotia is sufficient to supply the trade of our own retail butchers, to say nothing of what people like ourselves would require. If it were not for Ontario and Prince Edward Island we could not do business at all. Up to the present this season, we have been getting about all our supplies from Ontario; there have been no P. E. I. hogs offering. Now, however, we expect to see good arrivals from that section, as once killing begins, the farmers will no doubt desire to market what they have without delay. I fancy too, the shortage of feed, such as vegetables, bran etc., will have a tendency to increase the early supply of hogs." Speaking of prices in the local market, Mr. Fraser said: "We are paying more than we ought to, owing to delay in deliveries from P. E. I. Island. We could buy hogs cheaper in Ontario, but we don't want to bring along any quantity, because we expect to get Island stock at the same price. No doubt as soon as any quantity begins to arrive, local prices will be easier. Mr. Fraser reported a very good demand for smoked meats of all kinds; there was also something doing in pork, but it was hard to compete with the American corned article at the prices current today.—Maritime Merchant.

Owing to the enormous amount of tin and expense necessary in book keeping and making out small accounts as well as mailing and collecting same, The Guardian has decided that in future all ordinary amounts under one dollar will be accepted on a cash in advance basis and ten per cent discount given, except to those who have a regular advertising account who will still have the privilege of monthly credit.

The Grocery trade in Prince Edward Island may not be aware of the fact, and if they are not, they have not appreciated it, but there are a good many of them who got their Ontario flour a little cheaper last month than the situation warranted, says The Maritime Merchant. The selling price of Ontario of a certain grade was six dollars delivered at certain Island points, and the trade did not have any objection to paying that much; but shortly before the travellers for the Ontario mills got around for fall business, it is said, a jobber in Halifax, who had made very large purchases early in the season, sold an Island customer at \$5.80. The jobber was making a very handsome profit on the commodity at this price and was well enough satisfied to give the buyer a concession, although he did not say so, and could have sold to any store-keeper at the same price. The next thing that happened was that a traveller from an Ontario mill arrived in the Island, and almost the first man he approached was the merchant who had bought at \$5.80. Confronted with this, he at once telegraphed to his employer that such a grade of flour was being sold at a cut of 80 cents. The house did not care to lose its old Island connection, so it wired back to get the business. This traveller therefore sold at \$5.80. Just about the same time, another Ontario mill traveller came on the scene and discovered what had happened. He also wired to his house and in reply was told to cut the price if he had to. We have not heard how many travellers were in the field, but we are told that only one of the number stuck to \$5.00.
