

THE ROOSEVELT BOOM CANVASSED IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Feb. 28—The political situation in New England was canvassed at length yesterday by Col. Roosevelt and men leading the Roosevelt movement in the north-eastern states.

After Col. Roosevelt had received reports as to the probable line up of New England's 88 delegates to the Chicago convention, he put politics aside for the time and went to Cambridge to talk literature with the learned men of Harvard.
