### BROOKSIDE FARM.

The following is a list of the prices won by the breeding herd on hand now at Brookside Stock Farm, Augustine Cove: At the head of Mr. J. W. Callbeck's herd is Oak Lodge Mars, three years old next month. He has rightfully fulfilled the prophecy of Herbert Wright of Guelph, Ont., at the Provincial Exhibition of 1897 that he would be "one of the best stock hogs ever owned on P. E. Island." He was sired by a winner, is a winner himself, and the sire of winners—having to his credit already five first prizes, two of which were won at St. John and Halifax last fall. The first prize boar (under one year), the first prize sow (under one year) and the first prize sow (over one and under two years), at St. John and Halifax were all sired by him.

Another boar used in the herd this season is Brookside Mars, one year old in March next. He is a royally bred hog and took first prize at St. John and Halifax last fall.

Brookside Perfection completes the list of stock hogs used this season. He was bred by J. E. Brethour, Burford, Ont., who is recognized everywhere as the best breeder of Improved Large Yorkshires in America. He comes from great prize winning families on both sides. His sire, his sire's brother and grand sire carried off all the three prizes at the leading fairs in Ontario the last two seasons in the class for boars of any age. His dam carried off the first prizes for sow (any age with four of her produce) at the Toronto Industrial Fair.

Among Mr. Callbeck's breeding sows are such animals as imported Minnie of Oak Lodge, four years old, bred by J. E. Brethour, winner of five first and one second prize, and a breeder of winners.

Oak Lodge White Rose 3rd, three years old imported when coming two years. She has to her credit two first, three second and one third prize. These were all won at Toronto, Ont, St. John, N. B., and Halifax, N. S. She is proving a great brood sow, raising last season twenty six pigs.

Brookside Girl, coming two years old, is a splendid developed sow, a good breeder, and a winner, having already to her credit three first prizes, two of which were won at St. John and Halifax.

Among the young sows are imported and home bred ones that were good enough to carry off all three prizes for sows under one year old at St. John and Halifax last fall and give good promise of being able to repeat the same in the yearling class next fall.

The stock hogs and breeding sows now in the herd represent no less than twenty eight prizes, nineteen being first.

The sales last season were the most satisfactory Mr. Callbeck ever had, most of the stock last fall going to agricultural societies and government farms. Prof. Robertson, Superintendent of the Dominion Government Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., bought a brood sow from Mr. Callbeck at Halifax and he had only been home a few days when another order was received for two more for the same destination. This is conclusive evidence that the Brookside Yorkshires are well up to the standard of the best of the breed which on the Pork Packer's special for three years in succession as the best bacon hogs suitable for export trade, carrying off last fall both first and second prizes in which 128 hogs of all breeds, grades and crosses were entered.

### P. E. ISLAND MAGAZINE.

There ought to be a Prince Edward Island Magazine and here it is! Volume 1 Number 1 contains 47 pages of reading, covering a varied range of subjects, treated with considerable ability and literary skill. The first subject grappled with is The Liquor Problem in Charlottetown and concludes with the suggestion that liquor in this city shall only be sold by the government, by a salaried agent, the profits of the business to be expended in providing coffee-houses with comfortable rooms for men to spend their evenings in, with a chance to smoke, talk politics or even take a meal at cost. Social Enjoyment in the Olden Times is a well-written article by Senator Ferguson, which will have many readers. It takes us back to the days when the spinning and weaving were done on the farm and the worthy Senator writes of the women of those days and their work with the keen zest of a man who has not lost his interest in spinsters. Duvar as a Poet, by Mr. W. L. Cotton of the Examiner, points out some of the poetic beauties of the late lamented poet's more important works, Roberval, and the Emigration of the Fairies. The extracts from those volumes give a good idea of Mr. Duvar's best work. Other prose articles and sketches in the current number deal with Fort La Joie, The Cats of Charlottetown, Insula Felix, P. E. Island Coins, Side-talks with Sports and Local Happenings. The poetical numbers are mostly brief, the most pretentious being The Bar at Alberton, by Robert Harris, P.R.C.A., which has undoubtedly merit. Several of the prose contributions are modestly illustrated. The initial number is quite creditable in every way and the Magazine is worthy of a liberal support. It gives promise of attaining extended interest and value. It is issued from the Examiner Publishing office, is neatly gotten up and presents a creditable appearance. Yearly subscriptions are placed at the low figure of 50 cents; single copies 5 cents.

### THE QUEEN'S TRIP TO FRANCE.

LONDON, March 6.—There is much indignation in England at the scandalous and coarse attacks made upon Queen Victoria by some of the newspapers of Paris this week. The Libre Parole in an insulting article, said:—"Frankly, the Queen will be well advised if she does not come to France this spring. The constitutional fiction that it was Lord Salisbury and not the Queen who inflicted the outrage of Fashoda and the humiliation of Muscat on France will not suffice. It is well known that the Queen has declared England's policy throughout her long reign and she has never missed an opportunity of displaying her antipathy for France. Under the circumstances, therefore, her visit is an additional insult and defiance of public opinion. After this warning it will only be her own fault if she meets with a hostile reception in France."

M. Casaguard's Avenir says:—"The Queen becomes our guest at a moment when the British government has made its life more than ever our enemy. Her journey will be full of the same risk as the Maine incurred in entering Cuban waters and the French government is committing the same foolish act as Senator Sagasta, by not preventing France from being placed in such a position that the smallest accident might precipitate both powers into a terrible conflict."

After such insinuations as the foregoing, it seems possible that the Queen's visit to France will not pass without some incident. A special staff has left Paris to watch over her majesty at Cimiez, where her heavy baggage is already arriving.

Queen Victoria pays \$12,000 monthly for her own rooms without counting the expenses of her suite, numbering sixty persons. Altogether, her little trip will cost her about \$75,000. Her chaise, favourite white donkey and numbers of pet dogs and birds have been sent ahead.

Her majesty also has a curious whim about sleeping in her own bed, which is taken with her wherever she goes.

### MORE SNOW IN COLORADO.

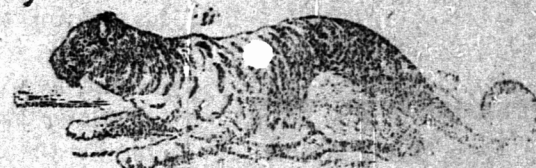
LEADVILLE, Colo., March 4.—The sixth week of the great snow-storm in this section of the State opened with a blizzard that is again blocking the railroads and threatening another coal famine. At a funeral here the other day it was necessary to have the coffin on toboggans dragged by men on snowshoes, but was found impossible to get to the cemetery.

The mining camps of Dillon, Kokomo, Climax, and Wheeler, which have been cut off from service for five weeks are in bad straits. The road dug twelve miles through the snow, and which was simply a cut eight feet deep, is again filled in with snow. Miners on toboggans will endeavor to remove women and children to Leadville for safety.

On the railroads in that locality it will be necessary to use dynamite to clear the track. At Leadville 1,500 men have been laid off on account of the blockaded roads to the mines.
