ELECTION PETITION

The Time of Court Taken up in Argument

AN EVENING SESSION

An Order Nisi Issued Returnable this Tuesday Afternoon.

Yesterday morning the election trial of Martin vs McKinnon, came up for hearing before Chief Justice Sullivan and The Master of the Rolls.

Messrs. W. S. Stewart, K. C., A. A. McLean, K. C. and H. R. McKenzie appeared for the petitioner and Messrs. A. Peters, K. C. and F. L. Haszard, K. C. for respondent.

The Chief Justice intimated that as the three Judges had appeared their signatures to the order to show why the proceedings should not be set aside, it was necessary that the three Judges should be present to hear the argument. The Master of the Rolls was then sent for and upon his taking his seat, Mr. Stewart, counsel for petitioner, argued that as to the insufficiency of time of notice of trial the respondent had given no notice of appointment of counsel on whom to serve notice and as to the illegality of holding the trial in Charlottetown, there was no other suitable place in the riding in which case the Act provides for its being tried in the most suitable place.

Mr. Peters argued contra that the Election Act does not provide for notice of appearance from respondent's solicitor and in the absence of appointment provides for other mode of procedure. He claimed by citations from the statute that sufficient notice had not been given. He further argued that the Judges had no jurisdiction to try the case in Charlottetown, as there were other convenient places in the riding with commodious halls and hotel accommodations and that the Judges in granting the order for travel were misinformed by statements made in affidavits of Sheriff Robertson and Ex-Sheriff Horne when they had no official knowledge of how many witnesses would be summoned.

The Court then adjourned to meet at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.
On sitting of Court after adjournment Mr. Peters continued his argument in favor of rule. In support of his reasons why there are other convenient places in the riding, he read affidavits of Charles C. Morrison of Flat River, Returning Officer in the election and several others.

Mr. Stewart, in reply, showed further reasons why the rule should not be granted.
At 3:30 the Judges retired to the Chambers to consider the arguments, before delivering judgment. After a short consultation the Judges again resumed their seats on the Bench and the Chief Justice delivered judgment to the effect that, as the application to set the cause down for trial had been made and did not give Respondent an opportunity to show cause to the contrary, the case should be reopened from that point and the Respondent given an opportunity to show cause by further reasons and evidence if necessary why the application should not have been granted.

Court then adjourned to meet again at 8 o'clock p. m. last night.
On sitting of Court after adjournment, Mr. Peters again showed cause why trial should not be held as in Petitioner's application. He produced affidavits from residents and hotel keepers in Pownal and Mount Stewart as to the accommodation in those places in the line of halls and hotels.

Mr. Stewart contra argued that the affidavits did not sufficiently rebut the facts alleged in affidavits of the Sheriff, were too general and should have set forth some exactness as to number of rooms, etc., in those hotels before the Court should assume that either of those places were convenient enough to accommodate Judges, Court Officers, witnesses, etc., to the number of some hundred or more.

Judges then retired for consultation and on re-assembling the Chief Justice ruled that in his opinion the affidavits produced by the Petitioner were too general and that the affidavits produced by the Respondent being more explicit disclosed that there was sufficient accommodation at both Mount Stewart and Pownal. The Master of the Rolls and Vice-Chancellor concurred and it was ordered that the order for setting down trial be rescinded.

Application was then made by Mr. Stewart to extend the time for the trial and an order nisi was issued last night and served on Respondent's agent returnable today at 3 o'clock.

Arrested in Halifax on Serious Charge

GOT MONEY ON CHEQUE

Which Bank Refuses to Honor—Money Lost in Speculation.

ARRESTED ON A SERIOUS CHARGE.
FREDERICTON, Oct. 28.—(Special).—Adam Harley, late Manager of the Bank of British North America here, was arrested in Halifax, charged with securing \$8,000 from Edward Moore on a cheque which the bank refuses to honor.

LOST MONEY IN SPECULATION.
Harley used this money to square himself with the Bank for money said to have been lost in speculation in Upper Canada.

THEFT ON OCEAN STEAMERS.
LONDON, October 28.—Sensational developments are anticipated in connection with a campaign which has been inaugurated by the London chamber of commerce against stealing from ocean caroes. It is asserted that goods to the value of tens of thousands of pounds have been lost during the past few months.

CANAL TREATY

Gives the United States Full Power

AS TO NEUTRALITY

And May Erect Fatifications—South African Claims Settled.

THE NEW CANAL TREATY.
LONDON, Oct. 28.—(Special).—Reports say the new canal treaty negotiated between Lord Pauncefoot and Ambassador Choate makes the United States sole guarantor of the principle of neutralization of canal and recognizes its right to fortify the canal and all the canals taken up by the States.
