OPERATED ON FOR AP-PENDICITIS.—Her many friends will be sorry to learn that Mr. W. A. Huestis, of this city is in the P. E. Island Hospital suffering from appendicitis. She was operated on Tuesday night and the Guardian is pleased to learn that at last reports last night she was progressing favorably and making a good recovery.

SAD DEATH.—Spanish Influenza which has been hovering in and around Souris for three weeks, seizing a subject here and there, and letting go after a few days illness proved fatal Saturday in the case of Mrs. George Roache, daughter of the late Mr. Wm. Gillium. Mrs. Roache who had been ailing a few days previous took a relapse which resulted in acute pneumonia, and only lasted a few hours leaving a husband and seven young children. The only other victim whose illness proved fatal was Joseph Jarvis of East Baltic who also had a relapse, and what rendered his case even more sad was that he was to have been married on the day he died. There was no service in any of the churches Sunday except a small attendance in St. Mary's church. All the schools are still closed.—S.

CHARLOTTETOWN NURSE DEAD.—Deepest sympathy will be extended to Mrs. D. Stewart, Prince Street, on the sad news received yesterday that her only daughter Miss Jean, had died of double pneumonia in the Hospital in Edmonton. On October 25th Mrs. Stewart received a telegram from her daughter that she was nursing an influenza patient and was well but a few days later Mrs. Stewart received another telegram this time from the Hospital doctor that Miss Stewart was ill of double pneumonia. The remains will be sent home for burial. It will be remembered that Mrs. Stewart lost a son just one year ago in France, while her second son John is convalescing in a Hospital in England and he with his mother and young brother Alexander at home will have the deepest sympathy of many relatives and friends.

CONVALESCENT HOME INSPECTED.—Yesterday the Militia Department inspected the new Convalescent Home preparatory to taking it over from the Department of Public Works. The new Home is magnificently equipped throughout, with a fine nurses home adjoining, and will compare most favorably with any similar institutions in Canada. The opening date has not been decided upon.

Word was received in Summerside on Saturday that Lieut. Ernest H. Strong now with the 20th Canadian Battalion France has been awarded the Military Cross. He enlisted on the 24th day of Dec. 1915 with the 105th Battalion and in the spring of 1917 went overseas with the 105th Battalion draft and shortly afterwards proceeded to France where he has seen continuous service in the field for the past twelve months. In the battle before Amiens he was the only officer that survived in his company and after the Captain was killed led his company through to their objective. Before his enlistment he was a practising Barrister at Summerside and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Edward Strong, of that town.

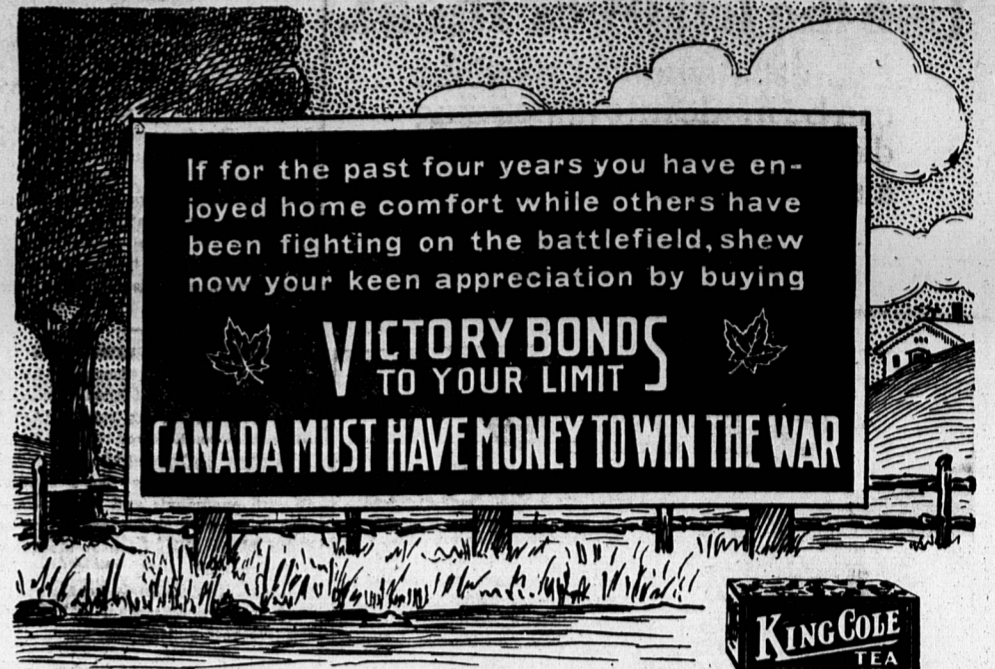

PTE. PAUL MENCHUK.—Private Menchuk was a native of Bessarabia, Russia, and 22 years of age. He came to Canada a few years ago. He enlisted in Halifax and saw active service in France. He suffered from gas attack and shell shock and was sent to the hospital and eventually sent back to Canada and entered the Dalton Sanatorium on September 9th. He died of tuberculosis on Oct. 28th. He has a brother in France on active service. The funeral took place on the forenoon of Oct. 30th. Rev. J. Heaney conducted service and interment was made in North Wiltshire cemetery.

SUPREME COURT.—The November term of the Supreme Court (for arguments) opened in Charlottetown on Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock. His Lordship Chief Justice Mathieson presiding associated with Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and Mr. Justice Hazard. The case of Major Schurman versus the Trustees and congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church, which was tried a year ago in Summerside and in which a verdict was given in favor of the plaintiff, is now being argued, the defendants moving for a nonsuit or a new trial. The case was still before the court yesterday at adjournment at 2 o'clock. The Court meets this morning at 11 o'clock.



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
