THERE was a small attendance at the market yesterday and prices remained but slightly changed from previous market. Eggs were quoted at 10c, butter 25-28c, hay per cwt, 80-85c and wild geese 75c to \$1.00.

REV. D. M. MATHESON, a Prince Edward Island man who preached in Zion Church, Charlottetown last summer and lately has been in Haverhill, Mass has accepted a call to St. John's Church Stellarton.

A PASTEURIZED milk factory will shortly be started at Southport by W. Aubrey Mutch, who has added to his large herd of cattle ten Jersey and Guernsey milk cows purchased from George Stewart, Keppock. The building is 50x20 feet and will be fitted with up to date separator and pasteurizer, having a capacity of 200 and 1000 lbs per hour respectively. The engine and boiler will be supplied by the Charlottetown Foundry and Machine Co. and the management has engaged the services of Henry Jenkins, late of Davis & Fraser, city.

NO. 3 Co. 4th Reg. C. A., met last night for the first regular drill of the season and did good work. After drill the company retired to a large room and Capt. D. A. McKinnon introduced to the members their future bugler who though quite young, is a very enthusiastic militiaman. Captain McKinnon then addressed the men, reviewing last year's work and laying plans for this season. Lieuts. J. A. S. Bayer, M. W. Wilson and Sergt. Major Sellar also made short speeches which a loyal and enthusiastic meeting broke up all filled with determination to bring No. 3 to the highest point of efficiency.

THE following are Halifax quotations:—Eggs are easier here, but the market in the Upper Provinces still shows great resistance. They are quoted considerably lower in P. E. Island and strictly new laid are now jobbing here at 16 to 17 cents, a considerable drop during the week. They will probably, so the dealers say, remain firm at this until after Easter at least. Butter is very scarce and any tendency to change in price appears to be upward. Creamery is offered in Montreal at 25 cents in tubs or boxes, and very firm at that. It is quoted here at 27 to 28 cents. Rolls are jobbing here at 25 and there is no dairy tub butter to be had. In meats the only change is in beef which is scarce.

SERGEANT INSTRUCTOR E. V. HESSIAN, is very successful in enlisting men for the Garrison Artillery Quebec. He is sending five men to Quebec today, and he expects five or six men from Summerside on this morning's train, when all the men from the western points of the Island, who intend going to Quebec, are sent. Sergeant Instructor Hessian will proceed to Mount Stewart, St. Peter's Bay and Souris. He will return to Charlottetown from Souris in about ten days from this date. The Garrison Artillery calls for men of good education and gentlemanly bearing. The different duties devolving upon non-commissioned officers in the Garrison Artillery are of such a nature that no man except those possessing the qualities mentioned alone can perform them in a satisfactory manner. Nearly four hundred men are still wanted at Quebec, and the Government is willing to pay big wages to any man who makes his mark in the service.
