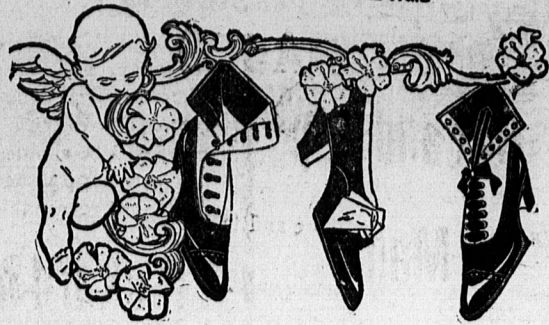

On Saturday afternoon the funeral took place of the late Miss Sarah Harvie, a most estimable lady whose life work was the means of doing much good in the community. For many years she had been in charge of the school on the corner of Kent and Rochford streets, where many children and especially the colored boys and girls received good education and the benefit of valuable Christian teaching at the hands of Miss Harvie. Her life was lived quietly, but none the less she accomplished a large measure of good.

Professor E. E. Prince, Canadian Commissioner of Fisheries, has returned from the Pacific Coast, where he has been studying the possibility of successfully transplanting lobsters from Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick waters into the Pacific Ocean. Two previous attempts were made by the Department to lay down lobsters in the Pacific, but they were not successful. It is likely that a shipment of lobster eggs with some adult fish, will be sent across the continent early next spring.

Friends of the Rev. J. L. Dawson in this province will be pleased to learn that the Rev. gentleman has lately been successful in another field of endeavor. A New Brunswick exchange says:—We knew Westmoreland County wouldn't be behind Albert in raising large potatoes or in anything else. In last Thursday's paper mention was made of some very large tubers grown in Alma. The largest referred to weighed one and one half pounds. Rev. J. L. Dawson, pastor of the Methodist church, has beaten this record. One of his early Rose potatoes has tipped the scale at a pound and three quarters. Another weighed a pound and five ounces, two more went a pound and four ounces each. There were several others which were but a very little smaller than those mentioned. Mr. Dawson also raised some very large potatoes of the Carman No. 1 variety.

A correspondent of the Guardian writes from Montreal: Today results of "The Railroad competition" were posted at McGill University. This competition was the result of prizes offered by Prof. C. H. McLeod to the parties handing in the best location of a "cut off" between Jacques Cartier Jet and the Point Angus Stops on the C. P. R. Total length of projected line was six miles. Competing parties were to consist of four men. Six days was the time given for work. As a result of their work Messrs. Rider, Fox, Johnston, and Dennis have carried off the \$800.00 prize. Three weeks ago prizes were given out for general proficiency in the final examinations of last year. Mr. Dennis received one of those in a list of prizes posted two weeks ago. Mr. Dennis's name appeared again for a second prize of \$12.50 for Mathematics. Mr. Dennis belongs to O'Leary in this Province. It will be remembered that last year he figured high in the lists of successful students.

At the latter place he will take charge of the fattening station and creamery for the remainder of the season.

At last week's meeting of the Provincial Executive the resignations of Leandre Buote and J. D. McMillan of the Tax Department were accepted. The question of building five new steel bridges were discussed. Tenders for the Crapaud, Orwell, Brush Wharf, East and West Rivers packet service were considered but none were accepted owing to the want of full particulars respecting the kind of a steamer the tenderers proposed to put on.

The results of the examination of 257 samples of maple sugar, purchased by the Inland Revenue Department throughout the Canadian market, shows that 185 were genuine, 57 adulterated and 10 doubtful, while 5 were declared as mixtures. One of samples collected in Nova Scotia, 15 were found to be genuine and 5 adulterated; in New Brunswick 18 genuine and 2 adulterated; Prince Edward Island 7 genuine, 4 adulterated, 1 doubtful, while 3 were declared to be mixtures. Of the 57 samples found adulterated, the adulterant appears to be, without exception, granulated sugar.
