About three o'clock yesterday morning he complained to his wife about feeling ill, and half an hour later passed away. Mr. MacDonald, who is a native of Alibary, has been in the employ of Mr. Clark for the past five years. Previous to that he had been engaged in farming. He leaves to mourn a widow and eight children, who will have the deep sympathy of all.

TRANSFERRED—W. H. McFetrick, for the last seven years manager for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island for the Crane, Limited, Company, with headquarters in Moncton, has been transferred to Halifax and, with Mrs. McFetrick, has left for the Nova Scotia capital to make preliminary arrangements for a residence in that city. SACKVILLE, March 3 — The death of Charles McKenzie occurred at his home on Foundry Street yesterday, following a lengthy illness. He was 69 years of age and is survived by his wife and the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Jack Rogers and Miss Elvie McKenzie, of Boston; Mrs. Danie McGinnis, of Brookfield, P. E. I.; Mrs. John Mann and Mrs. Hubert Mann, both of Campbellton, and Neta at home. The sons are Rodger, of Boston; Murdoch, Jack and Kenneth, at home. Surviving also are two sisters, Mrs. L. Dawson, of Albany, P. E. I., and Mrs. D. J. McKinnon, of Rose Valley. There are also seven grandchildren. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. Mr. McKenzie was a native of Prince Edward Island and came to Sackville some 40 years ago. He opened the first meat market in the town and continued in business here for over 30 years. He was well and favorably known throughout this section of the country. Failing health made it necessary for him to give up business a few years ago. 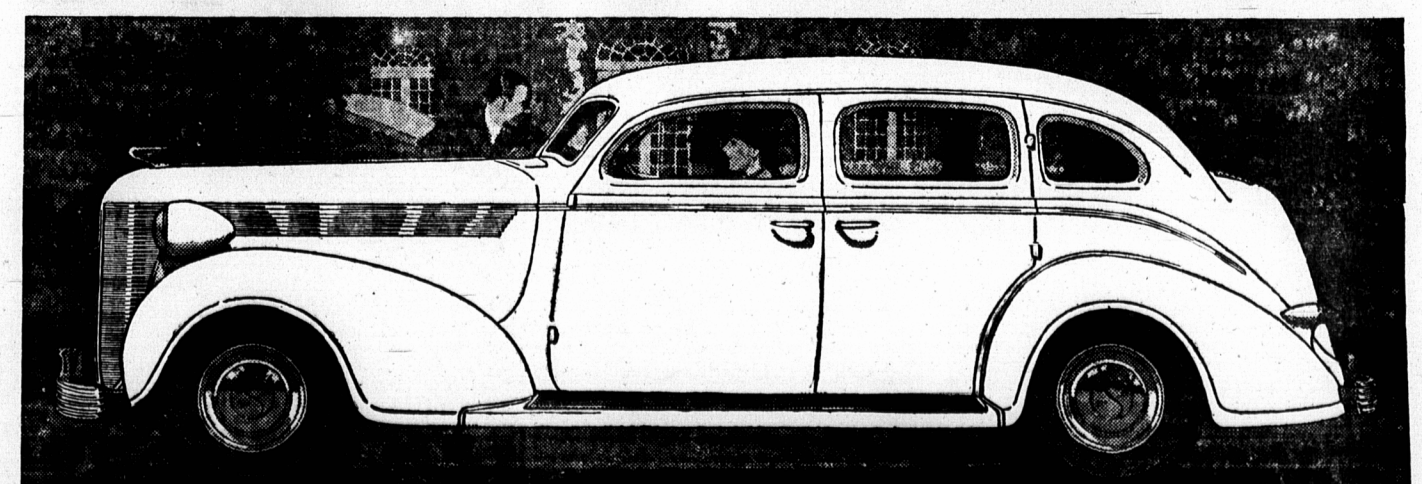
