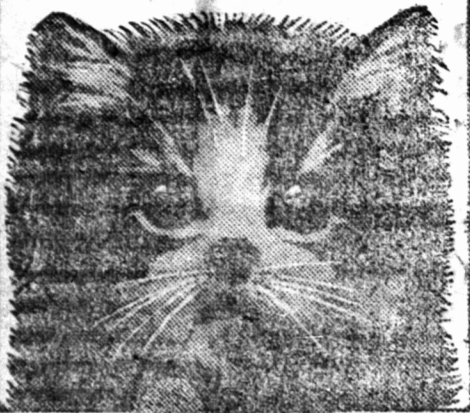

The S.S. Campana called here yesterday on her last trip of the season to Montreal. Her outward cargo consisted of 1405 barrels oysters shipped by Messrs James A. Sharp, John A. Sharp, Robt. W. Sharp, H. C. Mills, R. H. Montgomery, Peter McNutt and others; 69 barrels cranberries, shipped by Mr. C. R. Dickie and others, 50 bushels potatoes, 30 boxes butter, 11 cases eggs and 5 tons hay by various shippers.

Summerside has a case of diphtheria, a Mr. Campbell who was one of the number to go to the Northwest on the harvest excursions some time ago returned to the Island on Monday evening and stopped at the home of his brother Mr. David Campbell of this town. He took ill a day or two ago and yesterday his case was pronounced diphtheria. The Board of Health took the matter in hand and the house which is on Myrtle Street at the northwest end of the town has been quarantined.

Sackville was in Summerside yesterday and held a conference with a number of members of the Board of Trade relative to communication between Summerside and Cape Tormentine. Considering that the smallpox is so near us and increasing in prevalence the time has arrived when all the precautions possible should be used. The Board of Health has already moved to have all citizens vaccinated and also to have vessels entering our harbor inspected, but no decided action has yet been taken with regard to passengers by the S. S. Northumberland coming directly from or through the infected places in the other provinces. THE GUARDIAN understands however that a move has been made to have the Provincial Government engage a physician to examine all passengers at Pt du Chene bound for this province. This is certainly the only wise course. It is very important that the disease be kept clear of the Northumberland if possible, and to do this means that passengers must be inspected before boarding the steamer. The expense in this case might be considerable and the Summerside Board of Health rightly considers that this town should not be expected to pay for it. The health and welfare of a whole Province is at stake because of passengers being landed here nightly for all parts of the Island. The Local Government then might justly expend if necessary a few hundred dollars of the public money to safeguard the people of this Province from the dreaded disease which has made such headway in St. John. It is possible that the work of inspection will begin at once—at least this is the earnest hope of citizens in general.
