Our schools have long suffered from lack of adequate support. The increased cost of living so characteristic of recent years has brought matters to such a pass that teachers finding it impossible to live on the meagre salaries offered are quitting the profession or leaving the province in large numbers. Already many of our schools are vacant. If things were allowed to continue as at present, it is practically certain that next year many thousands of the children of this province would be denied the opportunity of obtaining even the rudiments of that education so absolutely essential in this 20th century and parents who desire to give their children a fair chance in life would be compelled to move to some other place where the things that really matters are more highly regarded. We spend money freely on every variety for almost every other purpose, but we have been very slow in making adequate provision for the education of our children. It was in these circumstances that the teachers before finally quitting a profession that had failed to provide them the means of decent subsistence thought it their duty to endeavor to awaken the province to the gravity of the situation by calling attention in a striking manner to the imperative need of immediate improvement. It is generally conceded that in this they were actuated by a desire not so much to promote their own interests as to promote the general interests of the province. According to an announcement recently made, the government has decided to meet the reasonable demands of the teachers and, in spite of all difficulties, to make provision for the support of the schools. Every thoughtful person who has any understanding of existing conditions must applaud the Government's action. It is inconceivable that the educational interests of the province should be made the plaything of party politics. The interests involved are too important and they touch too closely the life of the people; the effects of partisanship are too disastrous, to permit any sane and patriotic citizen to gain party advantage by stirring up opposition to a movement that seeks to serve the best interests of the whole province. Everyone who desires that we may not lag behind the rest of the world in the education of the young should exert every energy in support of the movement for better schools. It is safe to say that the teachers' organization will desire to meet the government half way and will most heartily co-operate to secure the best possible results from the increased expenditure involved in the Government's decision. And better results we must strive to obtain. The taxpayers of this province will not object, I think, to making necessary expenditures for education, but they will demand, and have every right to demand, full value in the way of efficiency for the money spent. In order that better work may be done in our schools, everyone having to do with education should awake to a full sense of his responsibility. Superintendent and inspectors must supervise with energy and enthusiasm. Teachers must throw themselves wholeheartedly into their difficult but tremendously important work, trustees must endeavor to discharge more fully their duties pertaining to their office, parents must co-operate heartily with the teachers and trustees and see to it that the children attend school regularly and give some thought to their studies, the whole community must realize that what ever else may be neglected the training of the young must receive full attention. If the necessary expenditures are made and if all work together for the common good it will not be long before Prince Edward Island will stand educationally in the very forefront among the Canadian provinces.
