

S'SIDE AND PRINCE CO.

The steamer Tiber arrived here yesterday from Montreal bringing considerable freight. She took away for Sydney 50 tons of hay, 11 cattle, 35 bags oats, a quantity of furniture and one passenger for Sydney.

Major Pickering late of England, now Provincial Officer of the Salvation Army of the Maritime Provinces, will visit Summerside next week. He will be accompanied by a band of musicians who will give a performance in the S. A. Barracks Wednesday evening 23rd inst. A unique feature of the performance will be a number of selections by a band of bell ringers. This will be a most interesting entertainment.

The steamer Elliot owned by Capt. McMillan of Charlottetown, made her initial trip on the Summerside-Sydney route yesterday, sailing in the afternoon with a fair freight consisting of 300 sashes, 300 bundles finished lumber, 50 doors and a quantity of hay shipped by Schurrin, Lefurgey & Co., and 18 head of cattle shipped by George Matheson, Rustico. The Elliot, which is an excellent all round carrier with special accommodation for live stock will make regular weekly trips between Summerside and Sydney, calling at Charlottetown only. This regular service with what is now one of the most important of our seaport cities, should be of considerable value to Summerside shippers and will no doubt be the means of opening up new lines of trade. Her next sailing will be on Monday, 27th, leaving Summerside about 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

A Shediac despatch of 18th says: The town is greatly excited over news which has reached here of the drowning of two men near Cape Bald, yesterday afternoon. Full particulars have not yet been received, but it is known the victims were a man named Arsenau, whose home is in P. E. Island, and T. R. Com-

meau, a resident of Cape Bald, N. B. They were fishermen and out in an open boat taking up their lobster traps. The water was rough and broke in over the stern, swamping the boat. It filled and sank, taking one of the men down to death. His companion managed to grasp the oars as they floated near him and, by their aid, he managed to keep above the surface for fully half an hour. His situation was desperate. He tossed about on the water several miles from shore, with apparently no hope of rescue. Another lobster boat came to his assistance, but just as it neared the man struggling for his life, he sank exhausted. The news spread quickly, though definite particulars were not given. Grappling for the bodies was begun, but so far without success.

matched. This will tend to make the Sports more interesting for the spectators and will tend to make faster time. A new feature introduced by the C. A. A. in the offering of special prizes as an inducement to riders to lower the Maritime and track record. It is expected that several records will go down before our fast ones if the conditions are favorable. Notwithstanding the rain, the track is in perfect condition, better than ever before, the riders say. The running events will be especially interesting by reason of the rivalry existing between Nos. 1, 2 and 5 Co.'s C. A., each of which has its contestants entered. A great improvement has been made in the lighting of the grounds, formerly done by arc lights which were condemned on account of the annoyance caused to riders by reason of the many shadows cast. The light is supplied by three hundred incandescent lamps strung at intervals of about five feet above the centre of and encircling the track. Several tests were made of these lights, and these proved entirely satisfactory.

THAT CROWELL FORTUNE.

We clip the following from the Observant Citizen column of the Boston Post of Aug. 17th. It will be remembered that some Prince Edward Island people were interested in this "fortune." I have just received a letter from Henry G. Crowell of South Yarmouth, Mass., in which he says, speaking of the much-talked-about Crowell fortune, "I have the most complete record of the Crowe or Crowell family from 1635 to 1900, including the names of those of that name who moved to Nova Scotia about 1670. I cannot find from my records anything which leads me to believe that any one of them can be a claimant rightfully to the alleged Crowell fortune." Mr. Crowell incloses a copy of a letter received by him from C. F. Fraser, superintendent of the Halifax School for the Blind, in which Mr. Fraser says, that he does not think it worth while to continue the struggle to get the mystic millions. He further adds: "After employing two legal firms, one in London and the other in Bristol, Eng., I have decided that further outlay is unwarranted."
