DEATH OF REV. C. G. THOMPSON.—The death occurred at the Presbyterian Manse, Fairville, N. B., on Wednesday, of the Rev. Colin G. Thompson, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Fort Kent, Maine. The deceased was born at Thompson's Corner, near Summerside, and was the son of the late Wm. Thompson. He received his early training at the Summerside Public School and later, at Queen's University, studying for the ministry at Pine Hill, Halifax. He was ordained to the ministry at Lorneville, N. B., five years ago and served at that pastorate for three years, when he accepted the call to Fort Kent. Some months ago he was stricken with typhoid fever from which he had practically recovered when he suffered a relapse and died. The deceased was a brother of the Rev. Wm. Thompson, of the Presbyterian Church, Fairville, at whose residence he died. Besides his brother he is survived by two sisters, Misses Lavinie and Annie, both of Fairville, N. B. His remains were brought over by the Empress to Summerside yesterday and taken to the Presbyterian Church, from which place the funeral took place at 2 o'clock to the People's cemetery and was very largely attended.—J.
