the vacancy should be filled without delay.

Sir Wilfrid in reply said there were so many matters of great importance engaging the attention of the Government that it might be pardoned for not having filled the Senate vacancy referred to.

He did not attempt to show that it would take more of the Government's time to make an appointment to the Prince Edward Island seat than it took to fill the other vacancies which have occurred within the same period and concluded by promising that there would be as little further delay as possible.

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Despite Sir Alan Aylesworth's opinion that the concessions granted to the United States in the recent fisheries negotiations at Washington are of no great consequence, many conservative members of the house representing constituencies in the maritime provinces are inclined to look upon them with suspicion. Mr. Fraser (King, P. E. I.) for instance fears that the privileges to be given United States fishermen who fish for cod and herring with trap nets, will prove disastrous to Canadian fishermen.

American fisherman, he pointed out tonight, will, under the new agreement, be enabled to place these trap nets 1,000 yards from Canadian shores without obtaining licenses. They will be permitted to place the leaders of their traps within a few feet below low water mark if they obtain a license. Sir Alan moreover expressed the opinion that United States fishermen, under the treaty of 1818, enjoyed the right to land on Canadian shores, a right which they have never exercised.

"If the United States fishermen can exercise powers to set trap nets on all the coasts of the maritime provinces," said Mr. Fraser, "it will be a serious blow to Canadian fishermen. These nets are very expensive, and they are capable of catching thousands of barrels of herring a day. Canadian fishermen cannot afford to purchase them, and have been accustomed to use the ordinary gill nets. The United States fishermen will be able to set trap nets over all our fishing grounds; they will be able to drop their leaders within a few feet below the low water line, and our own fishermen will be unable to compete with them. In my opinion we have given away to the United States fishermen great privileges apparently without receiving any return."

### HOURLY CLASS WILL WARN LONG TALKERS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A new piece of apparatus adorns the desk of Speaker Cannon. It is a double barrelled hour glass, designed to help members in obeying the most trying of all rules, that of limiting debate to five minutes. The glass is timed to run the sand through in five minutes. A white background makes the sand-glass visible from a considerable distance.

### AGREEMENT WITH UNITED STATES

OTTAWA, Jan. 21.—An announcement to the Canadian Commons by the Prime Minister indicates that the negotiations at Washington have been concluded. Sir Wilfrid said, "While I cannot state definitely at the present time I anticipate that the Canadian Ministers will leave Washington on their return journey on Saturday." There is every indication of a long and strenuous session on the question of reciprocity when Blanding and Patterson return and make known the results of the negotiations. The length and character of the debate will depend upon the extent of the reciprocity agreement, if one is concluded, as seems indicated in the despatches from Washington. Meanwhile the members are fortifying themselves with statistics and references to past negotiations on reciprocity. The Parliamentary Library has got out a special catalogue dealing with the subject, and what has been said about it from early days. It should prove invaluable in the debate.

### REDUCTION IN EXPRESS RATES

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—The Officers of the Canadian and American Express Co's in conference here have announced a reduction in the through rates soon to take effect between all offices of the United States and Canada. Several Canadian companies have held back up to present, because the Customs border necessitate extra work.

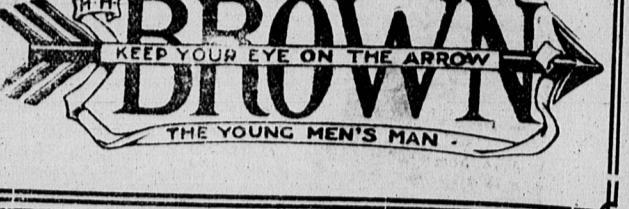

UNITED STATES AND JAPAN

DETROIT, Jan. 20.—Japan could seize Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, Bremerton, the Government navy yard, the five great Transcontinental Railways, fortify the mountain passes and have an empire upon which to live before the United States could get 75,000 troops to the Pacific Ocean, declared Representative Humphrey of Washington in an address at the Lake Carriers Association here last night.

The inefficiency of the United States merchant marine was the subject of Mr. Humphrey's address. He said:

"The nations of the earth know our condition and that we are utterly unprepared for war. They know our army is too small and our navy practically helpless because we have no merchant vessels as an auxiliary."

"In the case of a contest we need for transportation 250 vessels. We have vessels fit for that purpose, 200 was Russia at the beginning of war with Japan."

Japan has 600 merchant vessels on the Pacific fit for transports. The United States has six. Japan can transport 500,000 trained troops at one time. The United States not more than 10,000.

### LIVELY FIGHT OVER PANAMA CANAL

ted by treaties to the neutralization of the canal across the isthmus, regardless of the nation that built it." He recalled that during the consideration of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty in the United States Senate, all amendments looking to the striking out of the neutralization clause were voted down.

Richmond Pearson Holston, the hero of Santiago, took issue with the gentleman from Ohio on many points.

"In the question of any important matter in the history of civilized nations," he said, "can the gentleman cite one case where any nation having a vital interest at stake, ever undertook to guard and protect it through neutralization?"

"I would refer him to the question of the latest and most binding treaty in the world, the treaty of Berlin, which neutralizes and guarantees the integrity of the Balkan provinces. This is still in full effect, yet only two years ago Austria undertook to

annex some of these provinces without even a protest.  
"He refers to the Suez canal. The British distinctly refused to let the word 'guarantee' enter the treaty under which its neutralization was effected. In that treaty the word is that the contracting powers 'agreed' and not 'guaranteed.' The British had it stricken out, and it had been in effect but a few years when the English themselves violated it, and used it as a base of operations and overcame the sovereignty, or semi-sovereignty of Egypt. And then the British in 1878 in the Russo-Turkish war said: 'We will permit no act of war.'"

"They control that canal, and they have put up fortifications along the source of it, which, with their control of the sea, gives them absolute control of that canal as much as we could possibly get of the Panama canal."

"With the building of the Suez canal, communication between Europe and Asia was settled. The communication between Europe and Asia is not affected by the Panama canal, but the Panama canal will put every foot of coast line on the western

shores of all the Americas at the mercy of the European powers. It will put every foot of coast line on the Atlantic and the Gulf coast of the Americas at the mercy of any Asiatic power, which they were not before. It is essentially an American proposition. Our forefathers, with the instinct of their day, felt that in questions that are essentially American we should not be voted down or overcome by combinations of European nations. That is the foundation of the Monroe doctrine, and if we now invite the great military powers of Europe to join us in this purely American affair, we shall simply abrogate the Monroe doctrine.  
"If you have a war—and this has been worked out by the war games, and I am not guessing—if you have a war in which the Panama canal is not involved, and in which no enemy could seize it, a war with an Asiatic power, with our fleet in the Atlantic, then the war would be on the Atlantic shores, involving an occupation of the Pacific coast. But if you have the Panama canal, through which American ships alone can pass, and come out and form on the Pacific side, all the war games show that war operations will take place then on the coast of Asia."

### FISHERMEN'S IMPORTMENT MEETING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The Department has made a Customs ruling of immense importance to American fishermen. It provides that fish caught in foreign waters by foreign ships and brought to the United States by American fishermen will no longer be entered free of duty.

Fish caught in foreign waters where fishing is permitted by International agreement will be free of duty if taken by American vessels with American master and crew. Any fish which such vessel may buy from foreign fishermen will be subject to duty.

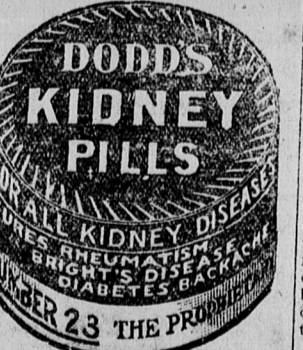
