Show Increasing Ministerial Majority.

COAL MINERS' STRIKE

Gen. Hart's Vigorous Pursuit of the Boers and its Fine Results.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—(Special)—Lord Roberts cables that Gen. Hart returned to Krugersdorp on the 1st, being 30 days from his base.

He had marched 310 miles, was in contact with the enemy 29 days, killed an unknown number and captured 95.

The British lost 3 killed, 23 wounded, 3 prisoners, and brought back 2,320 cattle, 3,241 sheep.

THE BRITISH ELECTIONS. LONDON, Oct. 4.—Special.—At 5.45 p. m. the returns showed 222 Ministerialists, 54 Liberals, 45 Nationalists.

Capt. Lambton of the Cruiser Powerful whom the Liberals hoped would beat the Conservative candidate in Newcastle, was defeated.

TRAINS COLLIDE

A Steamer Sinks a Newfoundland Schooner

WITH LOSSES OF LIFE

Political Troubles in Both the Liberal and Conservative Camps.

FATAL OCEAN COLLISION.

SYDNEY, Oct. 3.—(Special)—The Steamer Netherholme from England collided with the Newfoundland fishing schooner Henry M. Martin, northwest of Cape Pine light on Wednesday morning.

The schooner sank and two fishermen were drowned.

FATAL RAILWAY COLLISION.

SHERBROOKE QUE., Oct. 4.—(Special)—The southbound passenger train from Stanstead to Newport collided with an engine on the Boston and Maine railway at Beebec Plain on Wednesday afternoon.

Archie Bowker, fireman, was killed and 11 injured, some seriously.

CLERGY MEETING

Twentieth Century Evangelistic Movement

DISCUSSED AT LENGTH

Addresses Delivered by the Ministers of the Ch'town District.

Yesterday afternoon the ministers and laymen of the Charlottetown District met in the First Methodist Church at 2.30 in the afternoon and 8 o'clock in the evening to discuss the Twentieth Century Evangelistic Movement.

The clergy present were Revs. R. Opie, W. B. Thomas, A. D. McCully, Wm. Wass, F. H. Rice, Joseph Perkins, Thos. Hicks, G. M. Young, J. W. McConnell.

Rev. R. Opie, chairman of the District, presided. Consideration was given to the Evangelistic movement in its different phases. The meeting was not of a formal nature.

In the evening the meeting was held in the schoolroom of the First Methodist Church. There was a large audience present. The President took the chair at 8 o'clock. Addresses were given by A. D. McCully of Murray Harbor; Thos. Hicks, Little York; W. B. Thomas, Cornwall; D. H. Rice, of Souris, all of whom specially emphasized the importance of the movement. The work is for the laymen as well as the clergymen.

The following, with the exception of one or two sections pertaining to Annual Conferences, is the plan adopted:

- 1. That this evangelist campaign be regarded as of first importance in the business of the year, and that, properly understood in all its bearings and relationships, it have the right of way. 2. The evangelistic conventions or services be held in connection with the financial district meetings, and that on these

occasions the question of revival effort on each and every circuit be considered, and such arrangements made for help and co-operation as may be necessary to success.

3. That wherever practicable, trustees local preachers, exhorters, class-leaders stewards, societies representatives, and other official members, associated with choir-leaders, and presidents and superintendents of church societies be gathered in some form of meeting, where they may pray and plan together and so stimulate one another to zeal and effort in this great enterprise.

4. That Sabbath, October 14 1900, be specially set apart for this work, and known as the Twentieth Century Revival Sabbath, Revival sermons to be preached, or platform meetings held in all our congregations, pastors and people uniting in earnest prayer and faithful efforts on behalf of the unsaved. That, wherever possible, this inauguration day be immediately followed by revival services.

5. That an address be issued, signed by the General Superintendent and the presidents of the Conference, setting apart the Friday preceding the Twentieth Century Revival Sabbath as a day of solemn fasting and prayer, to be faithfully observed by all our people, followed by public religious services in the evening, that in the spirit of confession, consecration, and faith the entire church may enter upon this great movement.

6. That on the last night of the year 1900 watch-night services be held on every circuit and, as far as possible, in every church and that special efforts be put forth to make them seasons of blessing, so that the dawning of the new century may find our people rejoicing in the great things which the Lord hath done for us, and ready to go up to the help of the Lord against the mighty.

7. That on the first Sabbath of the year 1901, the morning service be set apart as a love-feast and sacramental occasion, and where there are several appointments, the people unite at some central place, as in their quarterly meeting.

8. That the first Sabbath of February 1901, be made a Sabbath-school Day, the first Sabbath of March an Epworth League Day, and the first Sabbath of April a universal Thanksgiving and Consecration Day, first rallying these important departments of our work, and then all uniting in a day of praise and thanksgiving before the Lord.
