The Tunnel Survey.

Mr. Alfred Palmer, the engineer in charge of the Tunnel survey, was in the city Tuesday. He informs us that the survey will be finished in about three weeks.

THE LEGISLATURE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATE

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—There was no obstruction by the Council, such a Bill never came up, and that is the best proof that they were incapable of framing a just measure.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—The hon. member says we tried to cripple the School Act, but the Chief Superintendent of Education appointed by the present Government has recommended the very legislation they burked in 1879.

Mr. NICHOLSON.—The Leader of the Government takes great credit to the Government for the way they have managed the finances of the country. I find they had last year a deficit of \$30,000 on the year's transactions and had they not received more than their estimate from the Land Office their deficit would have been about \$43,000.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—The hon. member says we tried to cripple the School Act, but the Chief Superintendent of Education appointed by the present Government has recommended the very legislation they burked in 1879.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—The last speaker says if the Government had not received so much from the Land Office there would have been a larger deficit.

When he has to found an argument of "ifs" he must be pretty hard up. He says the statement of Messrs. Chalmers and Davison was incorrect but he does not adduce a single proof.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—If that statement was cooked it was got up by the Auditor of the Davies Government. In the statement made up by Messrs. Chalmers and Davison they put down the half years salaries of the Teachers \$45,000 and then put down \$7050 in another place.

Hon. Mr. LAIRD.—The \$7050 was estimated as the amount earned by the teachers from 1st to 24th April, but the hon. member does not seem to understand the Education Accounts.

Mr. CAMPBELL.—Just in order to show the unfairness of that statement, they charged us with the unearned portion of the Dominion Subsidy and also charged us with \$52,000 for teachers' salaries.

Mr. SCRINGEOUR.—The hon. member first denounces the Government for the mortgage vote but he forgets to tell this House that he sat in a Government for eight years and drew his salary as commissioner of Public Works and while he found it expedient to retain the mortgage vote, he did not say a word against it, but as soon as they found the mortgage vote was against them they repealed it, because their interests would not be served by retaining it.
