LONDON A G O G AS JUBILEE DATE NEARS

Procession Route Takes On Gay Appearance With Flags and Bunting.

(C. P. HAVES) (By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, May 1. — Carpenters' saws and hammers were preparing the way today for next Monday's grandiose, three-mile procession through London streets in celebration of the Silver Jubilee of the King.

Not a window or balcony along the route from Buckingham Palace to St. Paul's Cathedral was without some sign of preparation. Stands providing seats at 12 guineas (800) each were being built along the full length of the course, ready to accommodate a great percentage of the full 1,000,000 persons expected to retain personal vantage points in advance.

Window places were being snapped up eagerly at three guineas each. All upper storey windows of shops, banks and other commercial establishments were being prepared for spectators.

Bunting of all British flags and many foreign nations fluttered in the breeze over the prepared way. There are Union Jacks, coats-of-arms and the special flags of Canada, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

No marked increase in hotel and restaurant prices has been observed, despite the enormous influx of visitors from all parts of Great Britain, the Empire, and the world at large. It is confidently expected nevertheless that the benefits accruing to London business of all kinds will be felt for six months after the jubilee.

Unrest Flared At Battleford (By Herbert Honey) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) WINNIPEG, May 2.—Tivity of industry outside the Saskatchewan river, the Battlefords today stand with Batoche and Duck Lake as monuments of victory to government in the raw. On this day, 50 years ago, revolt spun a scarlet thread that reached from Edmonton in the west, to Batoche, in the northwest, and cut through the heart of the future capitol of the Northwest.

Louis Riel's dream of a native Northwest received a crushing setback at the hands of General Frederic Middleton's troops in a decisive battle with rebel forces under Gabriel Dumont. The victory at Fish Creek, on the threshold of Batoche, where the Metis leader had set up a provisional government, was not immediately apparent at Battleford but a break in the uprising was foreshadowed.

On May 2, 1885, Col. W. D. Otter, in command of the second division of Middleton's forces at South Battleford, launched a determined attack to check depredations of marauding Indians. Bands from Chief Poundmaker's reserve, to the southwest, had terrorized the settlement while awaiting the arrival of Big Bear and his braves from the northwest. They planned to aid the rebels in a general uprising.

Breaking camp at Fort Otter, southwest of the present site of the "Old Town," Col. Otter headed straight for Out Knife Creek to attack Poundmaker on his reserve. His small force was unequal to the task, however, and after a fierce encounter during which his men were nearly surrounded, he was obliged to fall back on Battleford behind a prairie firescreen.

Included in the column were detachments of the Northwest Mounted Police under Col. "Bill" Herchmer, "B" Battery School of Gunnery (now Royal Canadian Horse Artillery) Kingston, in command of Major T. Short; Governor General's Foot Guards, Ottawa, under Lieut. T. Gmy; "C" Company Infantry School Corps (now Royal Canadian Regiment) under Lieut. R. Wadmore; the 2nd Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, Toronto, under Captain W. Nash.

Leaving their horses tethered in a hollow, the small force with three guns, took a position on the ridge of Cut Knife Hill. Many were wounded in the fighting that continued throughout the day. "C" company and the Foot Guards prevented an Indian flanking movement by occupying hills adjacent to the couple. The situation was saved when Major Short fired the grass with the wind blowing in the direction of the Indian.

RECALL GREETING GIVEN BY PRINCE (By The Canadian Press) LONDON, May 2.—In connection with the King's Silver Jubilee it is recalled in one of the Jubilee books being published that at the Coronation there was an affectionate greeting between father and son. It was the first big State function in which the Prince had taken part. He appeared in his Garter robes, and was the first to do homage to his father. Taking off his Prince's crown, he knelt at the feet of the King and took this oath: "I, Prince of Wales, do become your liege man of life and limb and of earthly worship; and faith, truth I will bear unto you, to live and to die, against all manner of folks. So help me God." Stepping forward, the Prince touched the rim of his father's crown and kissed his Majesty on his left cheek. Then with outstretched arms the King drew his son towards him, embraced him and kissed him on the right cheek.
