**Notes By The Way**  
(Continued from Page Four)  
Our agricultural production, which in the early years of Dominion history far exceeded our industrial production, has been overtaken and passed in the race. The factory has so far outrun the farm that last year the industrial production was valued at \$3,520,724.09 as against farm production of \$1,396,223.000, or little over one third of as much. In 1870 the value of Canada's industrial production was barely 22 1/2 million dollars, which increased to 481 millions in 1900; and is now 1,396 millions.  
Figures may be dry reading, but the facts they disclose are sometimes both eloquent and impressive. Canada has become a great manufacturing nation and this in half an average lifetime. And still her vigorous industrial activities grow and expand. Last year a total of 1,081 charters were granted to new companies commencing operations in Canada, representing a capitalization of \$824,000,000. This year, during the first six months, the new incorporations approximated \$20,000,000 a week and it would seem if 1922 were going to create a record in this regard.  
The National Policy of 1879 has been fruitful in securing the investment of hundreds of millions of dollars of American capital in Canada in branch factories to the number of about eight hundred. These give employment to thousands of Canadian workmen, whose wages are spent in this country. American manufacturers come here to get access to the Canadian market and also in this way to obtain access of the markets of the British Empire on the preferential terms, accorded to Canadians. Branches of British industries to the number of about 250 have already been established in Canada and the number is steadily increasing.  
These glimpses of the great industrial growth and activity of manufacturing enterprise in Canada should also serve to remind us that the greatest of our material needs in Prince Edward Island is that of indoor employment for all the year round. Without mines or forests, or a proportionate number of factories, such as other Provinces enjoy, we are seriously handicapped in the race. Beyond question, this want of constant employment at paying wages throughout the year is a fruitful cause of the exodus from our shores and the decrease of our population and it calls loudly for prevention and remedy.  
Our greatest material ill in this Province is the bleeding exodus, the loss of our population. They go from us because they are denied at home the constant employment, which varied productive industrial activities alone can give. Not all farmers' sons desire to be farmers, nor do all farmers' daughters desire to become farmers' wives. Increased taxation will never stop the exodus. Road building, which gives temporary employment in summer only, our busiest season is futile as a remedy against our greatest ill. If we had factories producing yearly three times the value of the products of our farms, as Canada has, there would be no exodus from Prince Edward Island.

**HOUSING SCHEME DISCUSSED.**—A special meeting of the City Council in conference with the Housing Commission was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Jenkins in the chair. Quite a number of questions were asked and matters fully discussed. His Worship pointed out that an order in Council had been passed by the local government, also by the Dominion Government, thus putting the act into effect and the matter was now entirely in the hands of the Commissioners and the Director appointed by the Government. The Commission will no doubt go fully into the scheme and be prepared to give information to anyone who may desire it. As the seasons late it is not likely that many will avail themselves of the scheme this year. A motion was passed at the meeting regarding one way traffic on Fitzroy St. during Exhibition days.  
**LOCAL "Y" ACTIVITIES.**—The Y.M.C.A. is preparing for what is hoped to be its largest season of activity and as a step in this direction, the whole interior of the building is being thoroughly overhauled, painted and put in a good general condition. Improvements to the bowling alleys and other buildings of Messrs. Lowe Bros., Messrs. Waller & Doyle having charge of the painting. Mr. Mark Pounds has for the past two weeks been busy installing new heating apparatus in the gymnasium and is placing new heating coils in the main boiler so as to provide for hot water showers at all times. Mr. W. Verner Ferris, the new physical director, arrived from Sault Ste. Marie last night, and will take up his duties at once. Both Mr. Ferris and Secretary Pendleton are now at the service of the community and will welcome any interview regarding boys' work programme for the season or any local work that the Y.M.C.A. might assist in. A Chess Tournament has already been started, twenty-five entries having already come in from students at Prince of Wales College, high school and the intermediate members of the Association. The tournament opens today. The formation of a Chess Club has been talked about and everyone interested in this grand old game should get busy and notify Secretary Pendleton.
