SEARCH GOES ON FOR LOST WOMEN FLYERS

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 6.—Through rain and low-hanging fog, cavalry and posses today covered many a mile of wild woodland between Strerrett's and Doubling Gap, southwest of this city in search of two women flyers believed victims of one more aeroplane disaster of the Pennsylvania mountains. Six planes attempting to aid were driven back by a ceiling lower than the mountain tops.
The women, Mrs. Ruth Stewart, of St. Louis, and Mrs. Debbie Stanford, formerly of Guelph, Ont., both experienced flyers holding transport licenses, left St. Louis last Thursday announcing they proposed a flight from New York to Buenos Aires. Their plane was last seen by Geney Shelton, St. Louis pilot. Mrs. Stewart's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Woerner, in an accompanying plane, Shelton landed at the Harrisburg airport yesterday afternoon but did not give the alarm until evening. He said the missing ship had cleared the last ridge of the mountains before a cloud bank separated them and that he had expected the women to fly into port before night.
Tonight Shelton asked points along the Atlantic seaboard for reports of any planes seen putting out to sea. The gasolene supply of the missing plane would have been exhausted before dawn today.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Jan. 6.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Evidence the New Zealand Government is taking no timid steps in pursuing its economy programme was given today in the announcement by Prime Minister G. W. Forbes of abandonment of construction of the new post office at Dunedin. The structure would have cost \$1,000,000 and tenders had been called for. The Prime Minister said further drastic economies were under consideration.

Late Banker's Will Probated

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 6.—Ten per cent of the estate of the late C. E. Neill, Vice-president and general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, will be divided between hospitals and universities after termination of the life interest of a sister in this share of his property, it was shown when the will was probated this week.
A number of bequests are contained in the will, members of Mr. Neill's household staff being remembered as well as those of the secretarial staff of the bank, who had been associated with him for many years. Certain paintings and other souvenirs from his house are bequeathed to friends, the balance of the household furniture and effects going to his sister, Mrs. Foster.
After deduction of gifts of stock made to various connections of the family, the income from the residue of the estate is divided in specified proportions among his sisters, Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Hanson; his brothers, John, James Stewart and Ralph Douglas Stewart Neill and eight nephews and nieces.
As is customary in this province, the amount of Mr. Neill's estate or the amounts of the various bequests was not released for publication.
The tenth interest to be divided among universities and hospitals will be shared as follows: Victoria Hospital at Fredericton, N.B., two-sixths; University of New Brunswick, two-sixths; Montreal General Hospital, one-sixth; Royal Institution of advancement of learning (McGill University) one-sixth.
Ralph Douglas Stewart Neill, A. J. Brown, K.C., and the Montreal Trust Company are executors and trustees under the will.

New Brunswick's Loan Floated

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 6. (By the Canadian Press)—Formal offering of the province of New Brunswick's \$5,062,000 domestic loan was made today. The bonds mature in 20 years and carry a coupon rate of 5 1-2 per cent. The price to the public is 97 and accrued interest to return a yield of better than 5.75 per cent.

Trans-Canada Plane Flight

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 6.—A trans-Canada aeroplane flight in winter will be attempted tomorrow when Jarl Grubbstrom, twenty one year old Swedish, flier will take off for Vancouver. William H. Croes, of Victoria, B. C., will travel as a passenger in the cabin plane.
Grubbstrom and Croes intend to make the flight in laps averaging about 400 miles. From Montreal they will fly to North Bay, they will go from North Bay to Cochrane or Oba Lake and then north of Lake Superior to Sioux Lookout. From Lookout they will proceed to Winnipeg and then over the Rockies via the Crow's Nest Pass.

MEMBERS OF BRITISH HOUSE MAKE APPEAL

Request That the Speaker Summon Parliament Immediately to Consider Far-reaching Questions Which Affect The Country.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Left wing Labor members of the House of Commons today issued an urgent appeal that the Speaker summon Parliament immediately to consider far-reaching questions which affect the country.
The appeal, issued over the signatures of James Maxton, David Kirkwood, George Buchanan, R. C. Wallhead and others, declared the state of Great Britain's industry had gone from bad to worse and alluded to "insensate proposals of cotton employers to restore barbarous hours of labor."
The document also declared the arrest in India of Mahatma Gandhi and Vithalbai Patel, President of the National Congress, made it plain the government was "embarking on a blundering policy which will commit the people of Great Britain to the repression of 300,000,000 people in India, which can only end in disaster."

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 6.—Postal officials disclosed today that a mail pouch of undetermined contents which left the local post office Dec. 26 for Boston apparently has disappeared. Postmaster C. W. Birely said he knew of no connection between the apparent disappearance of the local pouch and that which disappeared between Lowell and Boston.

Denies Reports

CANBERRA, Australia, Jan. 6.—(Canadian Press Cable via Reuters)—Prime Minister J. A. Lyons, today ridiculed reports that the appointment of Hon. H. S. Gullett as Minister of Trade and Customs would mean the tearing down of this country's tariff structure.
At the first meeting of the new Cabinet held this afternoon the Prime Minister declared consideration of revised tariff schedules to be framed in the interest of the whole nation will be the first business of the Government when Parliament assembles on February 17.
The first act of the new cabinet, composed of members of the United party, was to re-appoint Claude Reading to the Board of Directors of the Commonwealth Bank. The former Labor Government had refused to reinstate Reading on the Board at the expiration of his tenure of office, as his policies were out of line with those of the administration.

Gov't. Control Of Motor And Freight Traffic

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 6.—Complete government control of motor bus, passenger and motor freight traffic in Saskatchewan, regulations to be brought into effect by Order-in-Council, will be announced shortly, the Regina Daily Star said in its news columns today.
Regulations will include all such matters as time schedules, rates that may be charged for either passengers, or freight, safety devices necessary for operation, insurance of passengers, government taxation on the traffic, limits on loads, speed and special lighting devices. In the latter respect some of the vehicles used on the highways are extremely wide and it is probable they will be required to carry green side lights, the paper said.

Impressive Ceremony

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—Impressive ceremony will mark the presentation of the League of Nations Society in Canada disarmament petition with 500,000 signatures to Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister, next Tuesday morning. The petition will be carried to Geneva by the Canadian delegates to the world disarmament conference to be held next month.

Would Aid Alberta Cities

CALGARY, Alta., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Dominion Government will aid the cities of Alberta in financing approved relief works this year if the provincial government agrees to the arrangement, Prime Minister, R. B. Bennett told the Mayors of four cities at a conference here today.
The Dominion Government would aid in financing relief work, the Prime Minister said, on the understanding that the cities would give the provincial authorities collateral in the shape of short term treasury notes for their percentage of the cost.

Airman Killed

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 6. (By the Canadian Press)—Dale (Red) Jackson, co-holder of the world's endurance aeroplane record, was killed late today when an amphibian plane he was stunting above the municipal airport fell approximately 2,000 feet to the ground.

ONT. CIVIL SERVANTS GET WAGE CUT

(By The Canadian Press)—Salary reductions affecting 5,000 Ontario civil servants were approved by the Ontario Government today. The reductions in salaries include those of Premier G. S. Henry and his cabinet. Premier Henry lops \$3,500 off his salary and each of his cabinet \$2,500. Announcement to this effect was made today by Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Treasurer.
The salary reductions of the civil servants range from two per cent up to 25 per cent and affect all those with salaries of \$1,000 or over. The income of those with salaries under \$1,000 remains untouched by the reductions.
The reductions, graded according to the amount of salary are as follows:
Those earning \$1,000 and up to \$2,000, two per cent; \$2,000 to \$3,000 two and a half per cent; \$3,000 to \$4,000, three per cent; \$4,000 to \$5,000, four per cent; \$5,000 to \$6,000, five per cent; \$6,000 to \$10,000, twenty per cent and over \$10,000 the reduction is 25 per cent.
Employees of the Ontario hydro electric commission and of the liquor control board of Ontario are unaffected by the reductions.

News Briefs

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—Hon. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, former Minister of Health and Labor in the Ontario Provincial Legislature, died at his home tonight.
LONDON, Jan. 6.—(A.P.)—Earl Lytton, at one time acting Viceroy of India, today accepted appointment as the British representative on the League of Nations Manchurian commission.
SAINT JOHN, N.B., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—The district conference of land settlement superintendents of the Maritime area with officials from Ottawa and Fredericton continued at the offices of the soldiers' settlement board here today.
CHATHAM, N. B., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Canadian trades and labor congress will apply at Ottawa for labor membership of the tariff boards of the Dominion, Tom Moore, President of the congress told the New Brunswick federation of labor in annual convention here today.
ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 6.—The Imperial Tobacco Company's branch here will be closed indefinitely, according to an announcement by Manager R. M. Patterson, who mentioned "widespread smuggling" of tobacco and cigarettes as one of the reasons for suspension of operations.

The Royal Commission

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 6.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Royal Commission on transportation is arranging to be at Halifax next Monday and to reach Saint John the following Tuesday morning, according to a telegram from Arthur Moxon, secretary of the commission to F. MacLure Sclanders, commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade. At Saint John the commission will confer with the Provincial Government; at 10 a. m. and hold a public session at 11:30 a. m. leaving Saint John at three o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Storms & Gales Take Heavy Toll

Loss Of Life And Property On Sea And Land Throughout Europe As Wind Reaches Velocity Of 93 Miles An Hour.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—(A.P.)—Storms from Portugal to Scandinavia and floods in many parts of Europe caused six deaths today and distress for several ships. The British steamer Jersey City sent urgent calls for help from a position near the Scilly Islands, saying it was out of control with its machinery broken down. A motor barge sank in the Thames estuary, but the crew of three was saved.
The Grecian steamer Alexandria grounded two miles off the coast in Dungeness Bay in the English Channel and later was refloated. A violent southwesterly delayed departure of the liner Paris from La Havre, France, three hours. A fishing boat sank in a fierce gale off the Breton Coast, but the crew of two was saved.
The wind had reached a force of 80 miles an hour over some parts of Great Britain tonight, while the Scilly Islands were lashed by a 93 mile gale. The battleship Royal Sovereign and the cruiser Exeter went to the assistance of the British freighter Trevaylor, which had lost a propeller and was drifting in peril off Plymouth.
The tremendous gales were accompanied by rain storms which flooded much of England, Ireland and Wales and forced suspension of quayside and other activities in many places.
A boat belonging to H. M. S. Whirlwind was swamped at Sheerness and one seaman was lost. The liner Balboa, due at Plymouth before dawn, had to outside the harbor and was unable to land passengers.
The harbor at Lisbon, Portugal, was shrouded in dense fog and several accidents were reported. The French cargo boat Tabarca collided with a Norwegian vessel and was towed up the Tagus River. One member of the crew was killed and the vessel was badly damaged. The United States steamer Cranford came into the Tagus for drydock repairs after a bad time at sea.
The wind in London was so violent that a mail van was blown over on its side in the centre of the city. Rain and the wind smashed windows. The weather bureau said the gale was one of several due to strike this section during the next few days.
From Prague, Czechoslovakia, came reports of floods that submerged many homes and resulted in one death. At Landskron, Czechoslovakia, 150 houses were submerged and the occupants were rescued in canoes. Cattle, standing knee-deep in water, could not be rescued because of the slippery ice around them.
Halberstadt, Germany, reported the deaths of three persons in floods in the surrounding territory.
Considerable property damage but no loss of life was suffered in the neighborhood of Bar-Le-Duc, France, where the Marne and several other rivers were in flood.

JAPANESE CAPTURE CHINESE PORT

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Jan. 6.—(A.P.)—The port of Hulutao, south of Chinchow on the Gulf of Liaotung, which Governor Chang Hsueh-liang planned to turn into a great outlet for the products of Manchuria, was captured without resistance today by the Japanese.
Japanese army headquarters explained the occupation was part of the campaign to suppress banditry in South Manchuria and that the larger question of the port's future must depend on negotiations in which the Mukden Government of Tsang Shih-yi probably will be considered heir to the equity of Chang Hsueh-liang who was deposed as Governor of Manchuria by Japanese troops.
Already, however, influential Japanese are urging that Hulutao be included in the Japanese-controlled communications system for all Manchuria, in which the ports of Bairen, Selsin and Hulutao would share in handling the outflowing products of the province.
Two Japanese companies left Chinchow today for Ichow, 35 miles north of the railway leading into Jehol, on a mission of suppressing 600 "bandits" reported to be looting Chinese villages, and the other northeast against a similar band of 300 men. A Japanese communique estimated that between 18,000 and 20,000 guerillas and bandits still were operating in the district west and south of Mukden.
