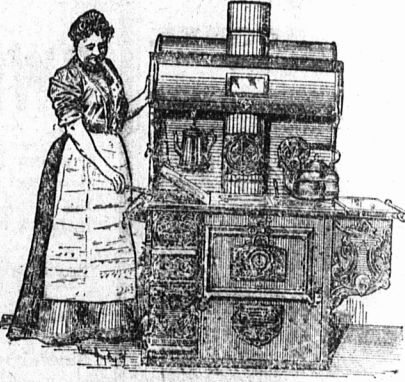

James McEachern of Bruce Stewart & Co., has been in town removing the hot air furnace out of J. G. Sterns' residence and installing the hot water instead.

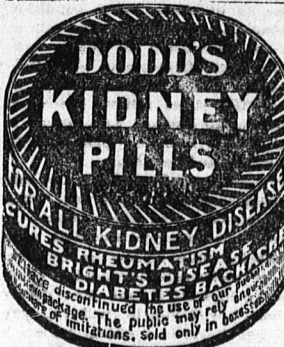
The large quantity of potatoes that had accumulated in the merchants' cellars are now being rapidly disposed of. The wharves are blockaded with teams all day long.
